The City Must Settle Up With the Philadelphia Company.

A LONG SQUABBLE WILL SOON END.

DOINGS AMONG THE JUDGES AND JURIES

The Philadelphia Company yesterday entered suit against the city of Pittsburgh to recover \$23,623 claimed to be due for natural gas furnished.

There has been no settlement in full since, and there is still due \$7,500 under that contract. Prior to the expiration of that contract the company had to continue to supply the city at the rate of 10,000 gallons of water pumped.

JUDGE REED SUCCEEDS HOTSPOTTER.

At the annual meeting of the stockholders of the Pittsburgh and Lake Erie and Pittsburgh, McKeesport and Youghiogheey Railroads the following officers were elected for the ensuing year.

A verdict for \$200 was rendered for the plaintiff in the case of William Craig against George P. Katz for slander.

In Criminal Court John McCarthy pleaded guilty to assault and battery on oath of John Jenkinson, and was fined \$10 and costs.

WILLIAM DEBNEY was acquitted of the charge of aggravated assault and battery preferred by C. Bollinger, of Spring Garden avenue.

In the suit of A. Patterson against W. H. Hanger, an action on a contract, a verdict was given yesterday for \$116.35 for the plaintiff.

CHARLES LOVENBERG is on trial before Judge Kennedy, charged with the larceny of \$100 from the residence of August Huesch, Shamokin street, on December 31.

The suit of Conrad Gundlach and others against Julian Wolinski and wife, for damages for an alleged depreciation in value of property in Ross township, caused by oil wells polluting the water on plaintiffs' farms.

ANDREW STEVENSON was tried for aggravated assault and battery on oath of Martha Taylor, the offense complained of consisted in abusing a son of the prosecutor.

A non-suit was entered against the plaintiffs in the case of George and Maria Marchant against A. L. Scott for damages for injuries to Mrs. Marchant. She was knocked down and run over by a wagon belonging to Scott.

DICKSON DINGLEY et al entered suit against the John Oil Company, claiming \$5,000 damages for an alleged depreciation in value of property in Ross township, caused by oil wells polluting the water on plaintiffs' farms.

THE ATTORNEYS in the case against Mayor Wymann and ex-Mayor Peniston, of Allegheny, are preparing for their trial, which will be taken up next Monday.

WILLIAM MCCONKEY filed a petition in lunacy for the appointment of a commissioner to examine into the sanity of his sister, Martha McConkey, of Snowden township, whom he alleges is unable to look after her property. J. H. Harrison was appointed as commissioner.

The cases of William P. Gilbert and Archibald Watson against McKeesport borough are on trial before Judge Ewing.

These suits were brought under the act of 1889 to recover unpaid bonuses—\$200 in each case—from the borough of McKeesport, offered during the rebellion to fill up the quota from the borough.
