One reason assigned for this contemplated exodus is that the return to coal by many of the mills and private families is rendering their quar-ter of the Northside unpleasant for residence

Rip Van Winkle's Wake-Up. The people of the Northside beyond Observatory Hill are awakening to the fact that in the matter of roads affording traveling facilities, and the consequent apprecia-tion of values, they have been practically asleep for years. The fine territory reached by the Perrysville road would afford beautiful sites for nice residences were there good roads upon which to travel. Some hope of relief is felt to be at hand, as the City Engineer is endeavoring to establish a grade acceptable to a majority of the prop-erty holders. ### SHARES STRONG IN SPOTS.

INSURANCE COMPANIES SAID TO BE BUYING LACKAWANNA.

Louisville and Nashville the Only Weak Point-Grangers to the Front in the Afternoon-Industrials Strong and Quiet All Day-Bonds Unchanged. .

NEW YORK, Jan. 27 .- The stock market again showed considerable strength in spots. An increased volume of business was transacted but the final changes are, with but few exceptions, of no special significance, and prices are about where they were last night. That there still exists a large demand for stocks is without doubt, and while the real traders are fighting the improvement stocks are passing into strong hands. As the supply of stocks diminishes the institutions and individuals who are large lenders of money are the most active buyers

The story that two large insurance companies have been large buyers of Lackawana obtained much credence on the street to-day, and the demand from smaller investors was again sufficient to cause a rise in the stock, but it was afterward offered heavily by a prominent trader, and the resultant decline was accompanied by rumors of a settlement with the shorts. Manhattan continued its upward movement, tairly rivaling Lackawanna in the formoon, and was followed later by Western Union.

The weak point in the list was Louisville and Nashville, which reflected the early selling for foreign account, and it was the only stock which finally showed a material loss for the day. Reading was again heavily traded in, and followed Lackawanna at a distance both up and down, and, like the latter, closed unchanged from last night.

In the afternoon new buying of a pronounced character appeared in the Grangers and Burlington took the lead in the upward movement for a time, and it retained the greater part of the gain at the close. The buying was largely for Boston houses, Among the low-priced shares Louisville, New Albany and Chicago was again very conspicuous for its activity and strength, but it stood alone in this respect, the others being quiet and traded in within the narrowest limits. The Industrials were strong but quiet throughout. A decline of 3½ per cent in Richmond and West Point preferred attracted attention, but a portion of it was regained and the stock, while lower, showed only a fractional loss.

The market opened with heavy pressure from the carily gains were generally wiped completely out. Realizing was liberal, but there were the same insignificant fluctuations throughout the list.

The market finally closed active and firm on a rally which brought Lackawanna up 1 per cent after it had sold at 145. The final cains of note comprise only Manhattan, Louisville, New Albany and
