Taylor, also bank directors and trustees, with conspiracy to defame his character and ruin him in property. Constable H. A. Reeder's safe, and with that and other charges trumped up for the occasion had dismissed him from the principalship without a heaving or trial; that they had refused to give him a public bail, and had refused to prosecute him. He denied the charges in toto.
