VICTORY FOR M'CANDESS.

The Ex-Sheriff Wins a Suit of Long Standing.—The Decision of the Court Very Important From a Legal Standpoint. Judge Slagle yesterday handed down an opinion in the Court of Common Pleas No. 1, which will be of the greatest interest to mill owners and manufacturers in general, as well as to the Sheriff of the county.
