Benjamin Franklin, Prov. Gr. Master, to grant a "deputation" under his sanction. Charges of Irregular Practices.

Early in September the Master, being ac-cused by several membeas of some irregular "practices, contrary to the dignity of the chair." is asked in open lodge to clear up the charges by the next regular meeting. This he succeeded in doing at the lodge September 27, 1749—"agreeable to the mem-bers." After this episode matters went on in harmony, and at the lodge December 19, 1749, it was agreed by the majority, to cele-brate St. John's Day by a dinner at the Tun Tavern, at 10 o'clock, and "each Mason to bring his wife or partner to a dance at night, the expense of which to be left to the

majority of the members after the dinner is over." The expense of this celebration shown by the next minutes, was £23 17s 5d, and 20 shillings were voted to the serv vants of the tavern.
