A hearing was commenced before Register Conner yesterday in the matter of the contest of the will of the late Jefferson Lane, of Verona. The entire balance of the estate, including a farm in Springdale township, is given to another daughter, Mrs. Mary Ann E. Shannon. The witnesses

McNeil and Kirk Randolph. F. W. Bealafeld was appointed executor.

The centestants allege testamentary incapacity and undue influence on the part of the principal beneficiary. At the hearing vesterday a small amount of testimony was taken on the side of the will, the witnesses to the will testifying as to Lane's condition when he signed the instrument. The hear-ing was continued until to-day.

SUING A BAILBOAD COMPANY.

The Peculiar Action for Insurance Brought by a Brakeman's Widow.

Mrs. Ida E. Murtin yesterday entered suit against the Baltimore and Ohio Railroad Coupany for \$1,000 insurance on the life of her husband, John P. Martin. He was a brakeman on the Baltimore and Ohio Railroad, and on December 25, 1891, was killed near Connelisville. Under the rules of the near Connelisville. Under the rules of the company be held an insurance policy on his life for \$1.000 payable to his wife. Mrs. Martin made a demand for the money and was referred to Dr. J. A. 


