CONSIDERABLE ACTIVITY WITH FEW INPORTANT CHANGES.

Chicago Gas and Lake Shore Are the Weak Points-Quite a Heavy Trade in Stocks Connected With Rumored Deals-Most Changes Are Advances.

NEW YORK, March 14 .- The dealings in the stock market to-day were neither large nor important, and while Reading during the forenoon was unusually active, its advance was in no way in conformity with the amount of business done. The interest in the market was confined to a few stocks, among which Reading, Lackawanna, Ric mond and West Point. Tennessee and the Susquehanna and Western preferred were nost prominent, the rest of the list being
