

LATE NEWS IN BRIEF.

James Scott, colored, murdered his wife with a poker Sunday night near Jackson, Miss.
Because of foot and mouth diseases in Chesire county, Ont., that county is quarantined.
The Washash river is overflowing and farmers along its banks are bewailing the loss of crops and stock.
Eight cases of small-pox have been reported at the New York bureau of vital statistics since Saturday.
The low lands along Illinois and Sangamon rivers in Illinois are completely flooded and crops are badly damaged.
Howard Echols, of St. Louis, colored, shot his mistress and killed himself yesterday after a quarrel. The woman, Jennie Harris, will die.
Dr. J. M. Bradford, a prominent Farmers' Alliance man, of Mulvane, Kan., disappeared some time ago, and foul play is suspected by some.
The German bark Charles Ludwig, from London, before reported ashore in Louisiana, has 10 feet of water in her hold and will prove a total loss. She is being dismantled.
A riot is expected at Vale, Ore., because of the murder of William Humbert by the Baker brothers, as a result of a quarrel at Democratic primaries. The militia has been ordered out.
The British ship Callixene, Suleter, master, from Fleetwood for Pensacola, went ashore during a heavy fog at the head of East Bay, La., between Southwest Pass and East Pass. She has lost 80 tons of ballast, but failed to float.
Mary A. Bellis, 16 years old, of Reading, has died of nothing but milk for 10 months, drinking three pints a day. She declines to touch other food, and her strange resolve is said to be due to disappointment in love. Her fluid diet agrees with her, and she has not wasted away.
Della Barden, who married Lyman K. Barden at Albany, N. Y., July 14, 1899, in South Dakota suing for divorce. A motion made Saturday for temporary alimony disclosed that, if allegations in the case are true, she has two living husbands and Barden has two living wives.
The Electric Wiremen's Union, of New York, composed of men who work on electric bells, burglar alarms, and other contrivances has ordered a strike of its members throughout the city for an advance of wages. The men have been receiving \$1.50 and \$2 a day, and they want \$3.
While Private Clifford, of the Cavalry detachment stationed at West Point, and Drum Major Anthony, of the Military Academy band, were out on a lark, they engaged in an altercation. Clifford pulled out a handful of the drum major's luxurious whiskers. Anthony preferred charges against the cavalryman, who was arrested, tried by Court Martial at the post, found guilty of conduct unbecoming a soldier, and sentenced to four months' imprisonment at Fort Leavenworth, Kas.
