

A BUSHEL OF MONEY. Nearly a Million Dollars, in Cash and Checks, Paid to the City.

TAXPAYERS' LAST DAY OF GRACE. Over a Hundred Protests Against High Valuations Filed.

AN IMPORTANT COURT RULING MADE.

Yesterday was the last day for 1932 when discounts were allowed on one-half the year's taxes on property. It will be remembered that Councils extended the time for discounts because of the Finance Committee's tardiness in presenting an appropriation ordinance, but no discount was given of the 15th, to-day being a legal holiday, and consequently the taxpayers thereby lose one of the 15 days of grace. This, however, only applies to those who do not have bank accounts. Any person who can mail his check today, dated April 15, and get it to the City Treasurer in to-morrow morning's mail, will still get 5 per cent off on half year's taxes, but discounts will not be allowed any case paid at the windows.

An immense amount of money was paid and cashed for as taxes yesterday. A bushel basket full of checks, ranging from \$1 to \$20,000, were received during the day, and in addition more than \$150,000 was received by the clerks at the windows.

The Pennsylvania Railroad puts up. The largest payment made during the day was that of the Pennsylvania Railroad Company. Superintendent Pittman called on the City Treasurer and paid \$25,000 for the company's numerous properties in various wards of the city as well as several thousand on his own real estate.

The day's receipts, including checks and cash, amounted to nearly \$1,000,000, and may even exceed that when counted. Last Saturday the amount received was \$1,200,000. The first three days of this week \$1,250,000 more was received. The total received up to date will exceed \$2,500,000, which is about the same amount received at a corresponding period last year and the year before. Assessors charged the City Treasurer with William F. Aull, agent for the Denny estate, for \$50,183.83. James & Langhin's check was for \$28,000. Thomas Mellon & Sons sent in for \$13,627.32 and another \$4,000 which they pay on their real estate all over the city. Accounting for the larger check Mellon & Sons filed a protest against the valuations and City Treasurer Dennis has ordered a hearing and a demand that when the court shall have adjusted the errors of the Board of Assessors the excess paid shall be refunded by the city.

A Hundred Taxpayers Protest. More than a hundred such protests have been filed by persons who have appealed their assessments to court in order to secure the 5 per cent discount on their September installment.

It was made in Common Pleas Court No. 2 yesterday that such protests must be respected by the city in case of a reduction of taxes by the court on an appeal. City Treasurer Dennis has ordered a hearing and a demand that when the court shall have already paid their taxes, with or without filing a protest, as well as those who have appealed their taxes to court, that action on their appeals. The ruling is in accordance with the action taken Wednesday by the attorneys interested in appeal cases, notice having been given the city.
