TAXPAYERS' LAST DAY OF GRACE.

Over a Hundred Protests Against High Val-

nations Filed.

AN IMPORTANT COURT RULING MADE

Yesterday was the last day for 1892 when discounts were allowed on one-half the year's taxes on property. It will be remembered that Councils extended the time for discounts because of the Finance Committee's tardiness in presenting an approprintion ordinance, but no account was taken of the 15th, to-day being a legal holiday, and consequently the taxpayers thereby lose one of the 15 days of grace. This, however, only applies to those who do not have bank accounts. Any person who can mail his check to-day, dated April 15, and get it to the City Treasurer in to-morrow morning's mail, will still get 5 per cent off on half his year's taxes, but discounts will not be allowed any cash paid at the windows.

An immense amount of money was paid bushel busket full of checks, ranging from ₹4 to ₹20,000, were received during the day, and in addition more than \$150,000 was received by the clerks at the windows.

The day's receipts, including checks and cash, amounted to nearly \$1,000,000, and may even exceed that when counted. Last Saturday the amount received was \$1,200,000. The first three days of this week \$328,439 45 more was received. The total received up to date will exceed \$2,500,000, which is about the same amount received at a corresponding period last year and the year before. The largest check received yesterday was from William F. Aull, agent for the Denny estate, for \$50,180 83 Jones & Laughlin's check was for \$28,000. Thomas Mellon & Sons sent one in for \$13,627 82 and one for \$4,000, which pays the taxes on their real estate all over the city. Accompanying the larger check Mellon & Sons led a protest against the valuations and classification of certain of their proper-ties and a demand that when the court shall have adjusted the errors of the Board of Assessors the excess paid shall be refunded by the city. A Hundred Taxnavers Protest.

More than a hundred such protests have been filed by persons who have appealed their assessments to court in order to secure the 5 per cent discount on their September

A ruling was made in Common Pleas Court No. 2 yesterday that such protests must be respected by the city in case of a reduction of taxes by the court on an appea against the City Assessors' classification or iluntion. The rule applies to those who ave already paid their taxes, with or with out filing a protest, as well as those who may hereafter pay before the court takes action on their appeals. The ruling is in accordance with the action taken Wednesday by the attorneys interested in appea City Treasurer Denniston said vesterday that in no case would be allow a discoun

on taxes not mailed to him to-day, as he was not permitted to correct Councils' error not recognizing Good Friday as a legal liday. "I have only 15 days left now in which to collect the taxes of those who only wish to pay the first installment," he said 'and I will be late now in my report to the Controller. If I do not enforce the law in this matter my report will be further de-layed, and that I wish to avoid."
