

HERR MOST BOBS UP

With the Story of His Prison Life the Day He is Set Free.

HE DID NOT GREATLY ENJOY IT.

Billy McGlory Becomes His Intimate Friend at Blackwell's.

WOULD LIKE TO SEE HIS ENEMIES THERE

SPECIAL TELEGRAM FROM THE DISPATCH. New York, April 19.—Johanna Most, the Anarchist, who ten months ago was taken to Blackwell's Island for taking part in an unlawful assembly, was released yesterday morning, and landed at the foot of East Fifty-second street. After breakfasting he went to the office of the Herald, of which he is editor, and wrote a long article on his prison life. Most refused to talk with the reporters. Referring to his personal experiences, he wrote: "To spend ten months doing nothing but drilling, drilling the same everlasting holes is, of course, inexpressibly tedious. Occasionally, it is true, when there were no holes to drill, I cleaned windows, and once I was hitched to a wagon like a horse to haul timber from the end of the island to a building site. The monotony of the work was the more oppressive, as my assistant during the first five months was a feebly demoralized Chinaman. "Then, for a while I had some bad New York boys, and finally, to my relief, Billy McGlory. This man is not the brutal fellow he is pictured by the hypocritical press, but an intelligent, well-read man, who can talk intelligently on a hundred different topics, and who thereby shortened my imprisonment very materially. "Looking back now on the whole episode in the punishment inflicted on me with such unprecedented frivolity, I must say it was the saddest part of my life. Generally when one has suffered some serious affliction he repeats the old phrase: 'I would not wish my worst enemy to suffer as I did.' I am not so good natured. If I could see my enemies—that is, a small part of them, as many as there is room for—at work on Blackwell's Island, I would enjoy the sight, and I am certain that the most of them would soon become consumptive or commit suicide. "But there are illustrious scoundrels of all sorts enjoying life, and men of my kind have to drain one bitter cup of humiliation after the other until a political and social thunder storm shall sweep through the world and cleanse the atmosphere so that humanity can breathe."
