COVENTRY, England, April 22.—The political world has happily been quiet during the Easter recess. The only matter of interest discussed during the week has been Mr. Gladstone's letter on women's suffrage, which is bringing in floods of protests from its advocates.

It is impossible for Americans to realize how much aid the Russian people need. They appreciate the American relief donations which are practically the only foreign assistance so far received. The relief committee we instituted proved the most efficient and had the warmest approval of the Russian Government.

The greatest problem at present is the restoring of farms and the furnishing of stock. One point the outside world has failed to recognize is the work done by the Russians themselves in helping the peasantry. Several aristocratic families are taking the sole care of enormous numbers of destitute people and many women in the highest St. Petersburg society have come to the provinces and established immense soup kitchens.
