Besides the above enumerated interests, all the factories, mills, coal mines, timber lands, oil interests, etc., and in fact every-thing owned by the society, both in Economy and elsewhere, will be investigated by the experts and acted apon by the auditors. It is asserted by those who profess to be conversant with the affairs of the Harmony Soclety, that this investigation will cover investments aggregating several hundred mil-lions of dollars, and they doubt if a year is sufficient time to make the investigation; but it may be that the methodical manner in which the society keeps its accounts will make the task much easier than was first

PURIFYING M'KEESPORT.

A Well-Conducted Speak-Easy Raid Fills the Little Jall There.

McKeesport, PA., May L-[Special.]-An open war was quietly inaugurated against alleged speak-easies by Mayor Tilbrook and Chief of Police W. F. Young to-day. It was conducted systematically and resulted in ten alleged disorderly houses being pulled and 42 prisoners being arrested. The socalled lock-up, containing six cells, built in a close, dingy room, with no ventilation, proved too small to hold the crowd packed therein like sardines. At no time in the histherein like sardines. At no time in the history of the city has it hold more occupanta, but they were packed in, as the Mayor allowed no forfeits to be taken, although as high as \$125 a head was offered immediately after the arrest as a forfeit for appearance Monday morning. Several were allowed to put up forfeits later, which made a little more room for the balance of the prisoners. The police were instructed to force doors if refused admittance. The proprietors of If rejused admittance. The proprietors of speak-easies have had a hard time of it under Mayor Tilbrook's administration, and under Mayor Tilbrook's administration, and have adopted so many precautions to avoid avest that it has been necessary to force deers or give up the battle. Mayor Tilbrook had the night force of 20 men in citizens' clothes divided into squads, each of whom had warrants for the arrest of certain persons charged with conducting disorderly houses, and were ordered to serve them. Among those under arrest are a number of well-known young men who would like to put up heavy forieits for liberty, but who were compelled to stay and lace the music in the morning.
