ONE HELD HERE IN THE LONG AGO.

Some of the Topics to Be Discussed in City Pulpits To-Morrow.

GLEANINGS FROM CHURCH FIELDS

The arraignment of Dr. Briggs before the General Assembly of the Presbyterian Church, now in session at Portland, Ore., calls up memories of the time when Albert Barnes was on trial at a meeting of the Assembly nearly two score years ago. The meeting at which Barnes was arraigned was held in this city in the First Presbyterian Church on Wood street. The leaders who then led in the attack upon the Philadelphia heretic were Dr. Thornnell, of South Carolina, and Dr. Plummer, of Virginia. An old-timer, who was present at that memorable meeting, said that he never heard finer pleading than that of the Southern divines when Albert Barnes was on trial. The result of that controversy was the separation of the Presbyterian body into new and old school, which bodies, after 30 years' separation, have concluded that it was best to come together again. The Barnes conflict was over imputation and the atonement. The Briggs conflict pertains to in spiration or the errancy of the Bible. Will the present issue divide the church as did that in the days of our fathers? Time will soon tell.
