Age trade report says: Our advices from the leading trade centers this week are al-most unitormly discouraging. Too many inrances are pressing their prod-uct for sale to permit any improvement in prices. Philadelphia, Pittsburg and Chicago seem to be subject to pre-cisely the same influences. While the so-called standard brands are well held, the makers of pig iron less favorably known are taking lower and lower prices. An inevitable setting of val-ues in general to a still lower level seems to be impending unless there is very shortly a decided improvement in the demand. 
