TOOK HIS LAST DRINK ON A TRAIN

Coroner McDowell was one of the busiest men in the city yesterday. During the day, in addition to personally attending to the distribution of tickets, etc., in connection with his candidacy for re-nomination, he had to attend to twelve sudden deaths...

Speaking of the day's business last night, he said: "This seems a little out of the ordinary, but I expect as the town grows such days as this will be common, and yet there seems no prospect of a public morgue and it is only individual sympathy and enterprise that enables us to have a place to lay these poor fellows out overnight..."

The first and most startling case of the day was the killing of the two Polish laborers by an electric wire early in the morning. They were Joseph Zewal, of this city, and Antonio Sokal, of Braddock. Both were employed at the Elcar Thomson Steel Works...

The Coroner held a partial investigation and will complete the inquest at the morgue tomorrow morning. The two Hungarians did not hear the order and placed their hands on the machine. Instant death came to them, they holding hands and forming a circuit of their bodies, through their ignorance of the danger.

Joseph Thomas, aged 59 years, was instantly killed at Rankin station just before noon. He was employed at the Carrie Furnace and was crossing the track in front of the works, when, confused by the trains passing both ways, he was run over and his body mangled. He lived at Keating station and leaves a family.

The death of Enoch Cooper, a machinist, at Mrs. Goodwin's, 4907 Highland street, last night looked like a suspicion. His brother, Isaac Cooper, at a partial investigation before the Coroner, testified that he deceased on Friday night had told him that he was feeling unwell and his life and he was afraid she would carry her threat into execution. The mother had not seen the deceased since, but he had been seen at an apartment, perfect health at 2 o'clock yesterday. An investigation was begun and it was found that the wife of the deceased had been drinking heavily during last evening, and had gone to Mrs. Goodman's with another man. He fell over dead without having been a complete drunk.

William Hoover, a young man, had taken his last drink. He had been working on the public school building at Parkman, and last evening boarded the Buffalo express for Keating station, where he was killed by a passenger train and almost instantly killed. The body was found on the tracks at Keating station and was identified by the body. His ticket had not been lifted, Hoover was 24 years old and was related to the late Hoover.

An Italian, name unknown, about 30 years old, was running down the West Penn railroad track just above Hoboken station last evening when he was struck by a passenger train and almost instantly killed. It was learned that he was boarding on Fulton street, Allegheny, and he had papers in his pockets bearing the name of John J. Cunningham. The body is at Willson & Spencer's, in Allegheny.

Of the four children who were drowned at Woodville Friday evening only two have been found. The names of the drowned are as follows: Elizabeth Coyne, aged 11 years, daughter of Mrs. Bridget Coyne-Robertson, of Nimick station; Mary Coyne, aged 9 years, sister of Elizabeth; Mary Enfelt, aged 9 years, daughter of Henry Enfelt, of Marshall; and James Holland, aged 7 years, son of Patrick Holland, of Woodville.

On Friday the Coroner's children were the guests of the Holland family. The four children, in company with an older girl named Williams, started out Friday evening to drive the cows to pasture. The road to the pasture field was along the bank of Charters creek. The Holland boy was playfully tossing his hat in the air and the breeze carried it out over the water. The creek is greatly swollen. He ran down the slippery bank to rescue his hat, but his feet slipped and he fell into the water. Elizabeth Coyne started to his rescue, endeavoring to pull him out, but she became overbalanced and fell into the water. Mary Enfelt next rushed down to the water's edge and succeeded in catching Elizabeth's dress. Bravely they fought, but the waters were too much for them, and hand in hand they went down to the water's edge. John Coyne stood on the bank and watched her playmates drown. As they disappeared she made a dash and joined them in death. An inquest was speedily called. A party was searching for the dead. Julia was first found 200 yards below clinging to a

DEATH ON EASY TERMS. Monuments and Coffins on the Installment Plan—People Who Attend to Their Own Funerals While They Can—Insurance Given Away With Goods.

INSANE ON CANALS. Harry Reynolds Wants to Build a Waterway to the Pacific, BUT HE WILL BE SENT TO DIXMONT. Takes McAliese Into the Scheme and Offers Unlimited Funds. THOUSANDS OF ACRES ARE GIVEN FREE.

A notice appeared in the daily papers a few days ago to the effect that an application had been made to Governor East for certain date for a charter for a corporation to be known as the American Monument Company. The incorporators are Gaines E. North, C. E. Suceop, Henry Miller, Donat Stehle, J. F. Armstrong, P. F. Kian, Otto Schmidt, Peter Shields, H. D. Becker and others. Alderman Suceop said last evening that the object of the company was to manufacture and sell marble, granite and metal monuments, headstones, curbing, pillars, vaults and general cemetery work. "Our idea," he said, "is to place our goods on the market with the least amount of cash. That is, we will furnish every body with our line on the installment plan. Very often people feel like paying tribute to some dear departed friend or relative, but have not the money to start under our plan a nice headstone or monument can be secured and be paid for as so much per week or month until all is paid for without the most serious burden on the part of the owners."

Several firms in the marble business were visited and the idea broached to them. They did not think it would affect their trade in the least. One of the firms, said Mr. Boyle, "the number of people who purchase headstones for themselves. Hardly a day passes that we don't receive orders for headstones. INSANE ON CANALS. Harry Reynolds Wants to Build a Waterway to the Pacific, BUT HE WILL BE SENT TO DIXMONT. Takes McAliese Into the Scheme and Offers Unlimited Funds. THOUSANDS OF ACRES ARE GIVEN FREE.

Harry D. Reynolds, the first victim of the great Erie Canal project, is now in the county jail waiting to be sent to Dixmont. He is a fine-looking young man. Reynolds drove stakes on one of the surveys and became so imbued with the grandeur of the undertaking that he has become insane on the subject. His ideas gradually grew beyond the narrow limits of a mere waterway from the "great unlimited sea" to the center of America's industries. He decided to construct an artificial waterway from Pittsburgh clear through to the Pacific coast. Hills and mountains were nothing to him. He proposes to get big wharf privileges, and will have floating mills to cut the timber through which the canal passes. He has taken Warden McAliese in as a partner, and is willing to place unlimited means at his disposal. The warden has, however, taken the cue, and Tuesday will ask the court to have the man sent to Dixmont. Reynolds, in notifying the warden of his having been taken into the new scheme, wrote the following letter on broken paper:
