ALWAYS PRETTY WELL STIRRED UP

A Young Kentuckian's Maiden Speech Makes a Decided Hit.

A GEORGIAN'S LOGIC IS LAUGHED AT

WASHINGTON, May 28.—The legislative appropriation bill was reported by Mr. Forney, of Alabama, in the House to-day and referred to the committee of the whole.

Mr. Durborow, of Illinois, from the World's Fair Committee, read a joint resolution authorizing the President to make a proclamation relative to the observance of the 40th anniversary of the discovery of America.

Mr. Hayes, of Iowa, spoke in favor of striking from the bill the section which authorizes the Postmaster General to fix the rate of mail transportation over land grant railroads.

Mr. Kendall, of Kentucky, who recently succeeded to his father's seat in the House, delivered his maiden speech, which was addressed to the silver question.

Mr. Watson, of Georgia, referring to Mr. Fithian's remarks, took occasion to read a resolution to the Democrats of the House.

Mr. Fithian, of Illinois, spoke in denunciation of the McKimley act and in favor of the enlargement of the list.

Mr. Watson then proceeded to extol the planks of the Ocala platform, and was frequently interrupted by Messrs. Fithian, Reed, Enloe and others.

Mr. Enloe replied to the criticism of the Democratic majority made by Mr. Watson.

After further debate the committee rose and the House adjourned until Tuesday, Monday being Decoration Day.

MORE MONEY NECESSARY

To Carry Out the Provisions of the Chinese Exclusion Act.

WASHINGTON, May 28.—Secretary Foster to-day sent to the House of Representatives a letter asking that \$100,000 be added to the \$50,000 heretofore appropriated for the enforcement of the Chinese exclusion act during the next fiscal year.

The act requires the registration by collectors of internal revenue, within one year, of all Chinese laborers within the limits of the United States at the time of the passage of the act, and of all other Chinese persons who may apply for such registration.

There is no appropriation under which the payment of such fees may be made.

The Secretary says he thinks it may be fairly assumed that the number of cases of deportation will be largely increased by the new act, and estimates \$50,000 as the expense of trial, imprisonment, and deportation of Chinese during the next fiscal year, or a total additional estimated expense of \$100,000.

CUTS THAT WILL CAUSE WAR.

The Legislative Appropriation Bill Reduced More Than a Million.

WASHINGTON, May 28.—The legislative appropriation bill was completed by the Appropriations Committee to-day, and reported to the House.

The only substantial change in the appropriation for the House is the addition of compensation for 25 additional members who will enter under the new apportionment.


Steamship Companies to Have Another Whack at Carrying the Mail.
