ASKED FOR A TENTH

An Attempt to Introduce the Old Missouri Law in the U. P. Church.

WANT THE ELDERS TO GIVE TITHES

Churches Must Keep Pace With the World to Hold the Young.

DEMAND FOR MORE TEMPERANCE WORK

At Yesterday Afternoon's Conference of the elders of the General Assembly of the U. P. Church, a resolution was adopted to petition all the elders in attendance for their pledge to give one-tenth of their yearly income to spread the word of the gospel in heathen lands.

The resolution came up at the close of the session which proved to be one of the most interesting ones yet held.

The Conference was held in the First U. P. Church on Union avenue, Allegheny. There was a large attendance, and the programme was interestingly carried out. A. W. Graham presided and led in the devotional exercises.

The first topic was entitled: "The duty of the eldership in regard to the promotion of spirituality in the congregation." The discussion was opened by G. G. Wallace, who held that this duty devolves on the elder as much as it does on the pastor himself, if not even to a greater extent. The character of the eldership in a church is one of the strongest points in the stability of a congregation, he held, and is the foundation from which spirituality is radiated and its influence carried among the people. The life of an elder must be pure, that it can be an example to the children and youth as well as to the older members of the church.

Must Make the Church More Pleasant.

Dr. McClung followed, and spoke of the duty of the elder to the baptized youth of the church. His argument followed closely in the line of thought that characterized the remarks of Elder Wallace. He dwelt particularly upon the necessity of setting an example worthy of emulation, and believed in making the church service so attractive that young men would derive the same pleasure they do in worldly ways.

S. H. Kaseley discoursed entertainingly upon "The example of the eldership in Christian giving." He said: "Christian giving is consecrating. It is not the extent," he continued, "but the spirit and the proportion of it to the prosperity of the men have. The widow's mite was a fortune in one sense, and Jesus said: 'She has cast in more than

all.' Give according to your income. I believe we all should give at least one-tenth of our income to spread the word of the Gospel in heathen lands that all souls might be saved. I would be glad if every elder here would make a pledge to the General Assembly to give one-tenth of his yearly income, and I here offer it as a resolution that we do so."

The resolution was amended slightly and pledged that a committee of three circulate a pledge among the elders for their names that all might know which ones promise at least the one-tenth. It was adopted, and in pursuance Messrs. Ferguson, Wallace and Smiley were appointed.

The members of the General Assembly attended during the afternoon the free organ recital at Carnegie Hall.

Want More Temperance Work. At the General Assembly of the church in the morning the letter of Mrs. H. S. Ellis, Secretary of the W. C. T. U., in which she urged the introduction of temperance lessons in Sunday schools, was referred to the Committee on Education. The report of the Committee on Education was referred to the Finance Committee to formulate, and that the appointment of the Committee on Ways and Means be referred to the Committee on Apportionment.
