Britain's Leather Imports.

The following is from the Chicago Hide and Leather, and furnishes facts of interest as to the leather trade in the mother country:

"Imports of leather in Great Britain during last April show a decrease as compared with those of 1891. The total importations last month amounted to 9,549,712 pounds, valued at \$2,648,590, of which 7,470,635 pounds of the value of \$1,878,060 went into home consumption, the balance having been re-exported; the quantity of foreign leather received during April, 1891. for home pur-poses was & \$14,933 pounds valued at \$2,356 160, an excess of 1.34,355 lbs. and \$498.-693 as compared with this yea.'s record. The total imports in Great Britain for the first four months of the year show a reverse result, however, as far as quantity is con-cerned, as during that time 449.232 lbs. more were imported than in like period last year. Notwithstanding this increase in volume, owing to altered market conditions, the actual value of these innorts (for home con-sumption) for the first four months of the year is less than for last year by \$451,550. A notable fact in connection with the import 5t. theirs for the present year is that while their grand total does not vary much from ha-t year's figures, the sources from which the imported leather has been drawn have changed very materially. Against 1891, this year's imports from France, for the four months, tell off \$99,250, and those from the united states \$72,1357. INDUSTRIALS STRONG.

THEY WERE THE ONLY REDFEMING FEATURE OF THE MARKET.

Other Securities Fluctuate Between High and Drooping Prices-Insignificant Con-

cessions Made From Last Week's Prices -A Small Volume of Business.

NEW YORK, May 31.—The stock market to-day was a quiet one, but a few stocks, as usual of late, displayed marked animation, and in all cases among the railroad list such activity was accompanied by ma-terially lower prices. The market displayed a subvice power when left to itself and only a rallying power when left to itself, and only the apathy of outside operators enabled the ake the material impr ssion they did in a few of the leaders. The market, however, declined slowly, and notwithstanding the drives made at Louisville and Nashville and Burlington, Lonisville and Assaville and Burningcon, other active stocks, with but two.excep-tions, show this evening only insignificant concessions from last week's figures or slight gains. The principal factor in pro-ducing the decline was the strength of the foreign exchange market, which at present invariably gives rise to the erry of imme-diate gold exports. There was a great deal of pressure upon Reading in the early trading, but it was well maintained, and the effort to make an impression upon it was soon given up, though on a simaller volume of business in the last two hours it yielded more rapidly. The only really strong point in the market was the Industrial group, and while the Cordage stocks failed to increase their late gains, Sugar and the Lead shares were prominent for the advances scored on a comparatively light trade. The general list atter a firm and higher opening made some slight further advance, but the drive at Reading in the early dealings and against Louisville and Nashville, and Burlington later, checked the upward tendency, and before noon prices, as a rule, were a shade below those of the opening. A rally in the after-noon was followed in the last hour by an-other drooping spell, and the close was quiet but heavy at the lowest prices. The loss in Louisville and Nashville is 2% per cent, and in Burlington 1%, but all other changes are confined to fractional amounts and a few slight gains were seen. Railroad bond, as usual of late, displayed none of the weakness seen in some stocks, but with a very widely distributed business some issues showed marked activity, and a firm temper was kept up throughout the session. The transactions reached \$2,250,000. The total sales of stocks to-day were 230,445 shares, including Atchison. 14,058: Chicago Gas, 3,50; Elie, 4,000; Louisville and Nash-ville, 25,420; Northerrn Pacifie pfd, 9,276; Reading 35,850; Richmond and West Point, 3,044; St. Paul, 11,200; Western Union, 3,078.
