Must Be Employed in Hauling Trains Here From Adjacent Countries. WASHINGTON, June 3. - Acting Secretary Spaulding, because of abuses of the law, has

issued a circular to customs officers in regard to locomotives used in traffic with adjacent countries, in which he says:

countries, in which he says: Every foreign locomotive on a continuous route crossing the boundary into the United States shall be allowed to bring its train di-rectly to and from the customs port on its route or to and from the termination in the United States of what is technically known as the "unn" of the locomotive, if its beyond the limits of such port, but no foreign-made locomotive shall be employed for the con-tinuance of the inward trip, unless such locomotive shall have been duly entered for duty in the United States. Officers of cus-toms are directed to observe this traffic, and to seize any locomotive found to be used in violation of the above rule.
