

A MATCHLESS BLAINE.

How Ingersoll Nominated the Maine Man Sixteen Years Ago.

WHAT THE NATION DEMANDED.

The Prince of Parliamentarians, the Leader of Leaders and the Intellectual Athlete of our Politics.

Below is a report of Robert G. Ingersoll's great speech nominating James G. Blaine for the Presidency in 1876, just as it was given by the newspapers on the following morning. It is already familiar to thousands of our readers, but the whole country will be glad to read again, for it is appropriate to the situation to-day as it was in 1876. Mr. Ingersoll said:

"Massachusetts may be satisfied with the loyalty of Benjamin H. Bristol; so am I. [Applause.] But if any man nominated by this convention cannot carry the State of Massachusetts, I am not satisfied with the loyalty of that State. Cheers, applause and laughter. The nominating convention cannot carry the grand old Commonwealth of Massachusetts by 75,000 majority, I would advise them to sell out Faneuil Hall as a Democrat headquarters. [Cheers and laughter.] I would advise them to take from Bricker Hill that old monument of glory. The Republicans of the United States demand as their leader in the great contest of 1876 a man of intellect, a man of integrity [cheers], a man who knows and approved political opinion. [Cheers.]

What Republicans Demand.

"They demand a statesman. They demand a reformer after as well as before the election. [Cheers.] They demand a politician in the highest, and broadest, and best sense of that word. [Cheers.] They demand a man acquainted with public affairs, with the wants of the people, with not only the requirements of the hour, but with the demands of the future. They demand a man broad enough to comprehend the relations of this Government to the other nations of the earth. [Applause.] They demand a man well versed in the powers, duties and prerogatives of each and every department of this Government. [Applause.] They demand a man who will secretly preserve the financial honor of the United States. [Cheers.] One who knows enough to know that the national debt must be paid through the prosperity of the people; one who knows enough to know that all the financial theories in the world cannot redeem a single dollar [applause]; one who knows enough to know that all the money must be made, not by law, but by labor [cheers]; one who knows enough to know that the people of the United States have the industry to make the money and the honor to pay it over just as fast as they make it. [Applause.] The Republicans of the United States demand a man who knows that prosperity and resumption, when they can come, must come together. [Cheers.] When they come they will come hand in hand; hand in hand through the golden harvest fields; hand in hand by the whirling spindles and the turning wheels; hand in hand by the open furnace doors; hand in hand by the flaming forges; hand in hand by the chimneys filled with eager fires.

A Grand and Gallant Leader.

"This money has got to be dug out of the earth. You cannot make it by passing resolutions in a political meeting. [Applause.] The Republicans of the United States want a man who knows that his Government should protect every citizen at home and abroad [cheers]—who knows that any Government that will not defend its defenders and will not protect its protectors is a disgrace to the map of the world. [Applause.] They demand a man who believes in the eternal separation and divorcement of Church and State. [Cheers.] They demand a man whose political reputation is spotless as a star, but they do not demand that their candidate shall have a certificate of moral character signed by a confederate congress. [Great cheering.] The man who has in full habit and unbounded measure all of these qualifications is the present grand and gallant leader of the Republican party, James G. Blaine.

"Our country, crowned with the vast and marvelous achievements of its first century, asks for a man worthy of the past and prophetic of her future; asks for a man who has the audacity of genius [applause]; asks for a man who is the center of the nation; whose heart, conscience and brain beneath the flag. [Applause.] That man is James G. Blaine. [Applause.] For the Republican hosts led by this intrepid man, there can be no such thing as defeat. [Applause.] This is a grand year—a year filled with the recollection of the revolution [applause]; filled with proud and tender memories of the sacred past; filled with the legends of the past year in which our soldiers were sent to the field of battle; a year in which the people call for a man who has preserved in Congress our soldiers' graves upon the field of battle; a year in which the people call for a man who has torn from the throat of treason the tongue of slander [applause]; a man that has snatched the mask of democracy from the hideous face of rebellion; a man who, like an Intellectual Athlete, stood in the arena of debate, challenged all comers, and who up to the present moment is a total stranger to defeat. [Applause.] Like an armed warrior, like a plumed knight, James G. Blaine marched down the halls of the American Congress and threw his shining lance full and fair against the brazen forehead of every defamer of this country and maligner of its honor. For the Republican party to desert that gallant man now is as though an army should desert their General upon the field of battle. [Cheers.] James G. Blaine is now and has been for years the bearer of the sacred standard of the Republic. [Cheers.] I call it sacred because no human being can stand beneath its folds without becoming and without remaining free. [Cheers.] Gentlemen of the convention, in the name of the great Republic, the only Republic that ever existed upon this earth; in the name of all her defenders and of all her supporters; in the name of all her soldiers living; in the name of all her soldiers that died upon the field of battle; and in the name of those that perished in the skeleton clutches of fame at Andersonville and Libby [cheers], whose sufferings he so eloquently remembers. Illinois nominates for the next President of this country that prince of parliamentarians, that leader of leaders, James G. Blaine. [Loud and protracted cheers.]
