LEATHER OUTLOOK IN OLD ENGLAND

OFFICE OF THE DISPATCH, PITTSBURG, TUESDAY, June 7.

The Edgar Thomson works at Braddock are being pushed to their capacity, and the daily output is in round numbers 1,600 tons of finished steel rails. The demand of late has been principally for light rails and orders are already booked to an amount sufficient to take the entire output until September. A year ago the daily capacity of the Edgar Thomson works was less by 300 tons than it is at this time. With the increased capacity the cost of manufacturing has been reduced sufficiently to make a difference of \$2,000 per day, by the intro-

duction of new machinery.

Heavy rails are now selling at \$30 00 per ton and light rails at \$30 75. Within the past three years prices have decreased \$3 per ton below those figures and in the same time cost of production has diminished. Summer Hardware Booming.

The demand for summer hardware such as fly screens, lawn mowers and refrigerators was this season delayed at least three weeks, as compared with the average season. This was due largely to the cold, wet weather which prevailed all through April and the greater part of May. In the past ten days there has been extraordinary ac-tivity in this department of trade, and the lost time has been more than made up.

When They Hear That the Senate Stands in the Way of the Anti-Option Bil --Bad Crop Reports at Home and Abroad Help Prices. CHICAGO - Wheat was nervous and

was soon recorded. This was a continua-tion of the weakness developed yesterday, when it became known that the Hatch anti-option bill had been passed by the House of Representatives. There was a feeling of un-certainty and anxiety, and some long wheat

certainty and anxiety, and some long wheat came on the market. Some favorable crop reports from the spring wheat belt in the Northwest, and an increased acreage with favorable advices from winter wheat in Ransas, added to the weakness.

Later, or advices from Washington that there was no possibility that the Hatch bill would pass the Senate, together with less favorable reports from France and Russa as to crops, there was a sharp rally of 2½c, but a reaction of ½c on sales by longs to realize profits followed. ASSAULTS ON THE COALERS HAVE BUT LITTLE EFFECT.

Foreign Buying Also Favors the Bulls-Stories of Damages to Crops Greatly Exaggerated-Burlington Driven Down 1 Per Cent-Railroad Bonds Quiet.


