

NEED READY MONEY.

The Oil Region Suffers Require Nothing but Cash.

PITTSBURG'S COMMITTEE RECOVERS

And Tells How It Saw in the Flood and Fire-Stricken District.

LIBERAL CONTRIBUTIONS COMING IN

The Relief Committee appointed at the citizens' meeting in City Hall Monday afternoon, and which went direct in a special train to the stricken oil region, returned to Pittsburgh yesterday morning, after spending a night among the sufferers from the flood and fire. Immediately after arriving in Pittsburgh, the committee authorized the following statement:

We find the burned and flooded districts to cover about four and a half or five acres and that there are at least 200 people homeless and destitute. Sixty-seven recovered dead bodies. About 100 families in need, and that what is wanted most is money. There is an excellent Relief Committee organized in Oil City, composed of reputable, thorough-going business men who are exactly understanding the situation, and who are quite competent to take charge of the work of relief at Oil City.

Mayor Gourley says that what is most needed by the sufferers is ready money. They are being supplied with food, bedding, and provisions by neighboring towns. He says the Pittsburgh committee was met at Oil City by a party of intelligent, earnest business men, who are fully competent to take care of their unfortunate, and who are extending relief in a systematic and careful way.

The Pittsburghers were escorted to the Oil Exchange where a public meeting was held at which the situation was thoroughly explained by W. J. Hinkle, Colonel Hullings and others. The Pittsburgh committee told them they had been sent to the valley because they were prepared to do, after which the meeting adjourned. The Pittsburgh and Oil City Relief Committees then met and it was decided to leave all the work of relief at Oil City to the Oil City committee. General Wiley escorted the Pittsburgh committee through the burned district of the city, after which the Pittsburghers, with the exception of Mrs. J. V. Vandergriff and George Heard, returned home. The others remained in Oil City overnight and yesterday morning started overland to Titusville, their way to Titusville they went through the valley between the two places and at 9 o'clock last night Mayor Gourley received the following telegram from City Hall at Titusville:

We find the situation here worse than at Oil City, the loss of life and property being greater. There are at Oil City along the creek, about 1000 people in need of food, clothing, and other necessities. It is our judgment that \$20,000 will be required to afford the necessary relief of which amount \$50,000 has been subscribed.

James B. Scott, of the Pittsburgh Relief Committee, in speaking of the oil country disaster yesterday, said: "The people are in a certain extent mistaken about this disaster. They think it is a disaster, but at Johnston's whole place was destroyed, and the people who came out of the flood alive had nothing with which to care for themselves. They need outside help and they need outside people to administer it. This time it is different. About 10 percent of Oil City and of Titusville was destroyed. This left both towns in shape to do all the work needed, and plenty of efficient people to do all the work required; they do not need committees of doctors or nurses or charitable associations, but they have plenty of their own who are doing excellent service. They don't need any outside help. They need outside money, and that is what they need most. In both towns there are many persons who must be cared for until they are able to get on their feet. The local committees have made excellent arrangements by which they can buy at cost, and all our work here is to raise money for them. It is just as if a disaster should kill a thousand people in Pittsburgh. This town could care for them and we would not need committees from New York or Chicago. That is the case in Oil City and Titusville today."

Treasurer Thompson, who has charge of the relief funds, yesterday received a number of liberal contributions.
