#### PITTSBURG'S COMMITTEE RETURNS

And Tells What It Saw in the Flood and The Relief Committee's House-to-House Fire-Stricken District.

## LIBERAL CONTRIBUTIONS COMING IN

The Relief Committee appointed at the citizens' meeting in City Hall Monday afternoon, and which went direct in a special train to the stricken oil region, returned to Pittsburg vesterday morning, after spending a night among the sufferers from the flood and fire. Immediately after arriving in Pittsburg, the committee author-

ized the following statement: We find the burned and flooded district to cover about four and a half or five acres and that there are at least 350 people homeless and destitute. Sixty-seven recovered dead odies. About 100 families in need, and that hat is wanted most is money. There is an excellent Relief Committee organized in Oil City, composed of reputable, thorough-going usiness men who exactly understand the situation, and who are quite competent to

take charge of the work of relief at Oil City. Mayor Gourley says what is most needed by the sufferers is ready money. They are being supplied with bed, bedding, and proons by neighboring towns. He says the Pittsburg committee was met at Oil City by a party of intelligent, earnest business men, who are fully competent to take care of their unfortunates, and who are extending relief in a systematic and careful way. The Oil City committee, Mayor Gourley says, was headed by Mayor Hunt.

Public Meeting at Oll City. The Pittsburgers were escorted to the Oil Exchange where a public meeting was held at which the situation was thoroughly ex-plained by W. J. Hukle, Colonel Hulings and others. The Pittsburg committee told what they had been sent for and what they were prepared to do, after which the meeting ourned. The Pittsburg and Oil City Re-Committees then met and it was decided leave all the work of relief with the Oil sommittee. General Wiley escorted he Pittsburg committee through the burned listrict of the city, after which the Pittsburgrs, with the exception of John Eaton, J. J. andergrift and George Heard, returned The others remained in Oil City ight and vesterday morning started verland to Titusville. On their way to etween the two places and at 9 o'clock last ght Mayor Gourley received the following legram from them dated at Titusville: We find the situation here worse than at https://dx.the.loss of life and property being reater. There are at Oil City along the reak and at Timeville fully 1,000 people in usen need of aid. It is our judgment that 200,000 will be required to afford the necessary relief, of which amount \$50,000 has been subscribed.

Vandergrift and Heard. It is Not a Second Johnstown. lames B. Scott, of the Pittsburg Relief umittee, in speaking of the oil country disaster vesterday, said: "The people are to a certain extent mistaken about this dis-aster. This is not a second Johnstown. At Johnstown the whole place was destroyed and the people who came out of the flood alive had nothing with which to care for anyone. They needed outside help and needed outside neople to administer This time it is different. About 10 per it. This time it is different. About 10 percent of Oil City and of Titusville was destroyed. This left both towns in shape to do all the work needed. They had plenty efficient people to do all the work required; they don't need outside committees, or doctors or nurses or charitable associations. They have plenty of their own, who are done or have plenty of their own who are doing ex-cellent service. They don't need any old clothes or old shoes or any provisions. What they do need is money, and the more of that the people give the better. In both

cared for until they can get to work again. The local committees have made excellent arrangements by which they can buy at for them. It is just as if a disaster should kill a thousand people in Pittsburg. This town could care for them and we would not eed committees from New York or Chicago. that is the case in Oil City and Titusville
