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THE WEATHER.

For Western Pennsylvania, West Virginia and Ohio: Continued Warm South Winds; Clear Weather; There Are No Indications of Change of These Conditions.

There is quite an extensive area in the Southeast sections over which the atmospheric pressure is slightly above the normal.

The depression that has for the past week lingered in the Northwest still rests over that quarter and is central in Western Minnesota. There has been almost a complete absence of rainfall.

A warm wave covers the country east of the Rocky Mountains. There is no promise of its cessation or a change from the droughty conditions now prevailing till the spring passes over the country, moving sufficiently south to bring rain from the Gulf of Mexico. The trough-like low area that passed from Minnesota to Texas may later develop such conditions in Western Texas.

WAVERING athletes are in trouble over the question of whether to accept the Western Association's offer of a \$10,000 bonus for a season's play. The outcome of the debate is being very hotly debated in the West.
