

TOOK A TURN UPWARD

McDonald's Production Went Up 3,000 Barrels Yesterday.

GORDON SANDERS RESPONSIBLE

Oil Found in a Wildcat Well 85 Miles West of Sistersville.

NEW WORK STARTING ABOUT CORAOPOLIS

The McDonald field got off the toboggan yesterday, as predicted, and started back toward the top of the incline. It is very eccentric in this respect and none can tell when it is going to put on the brakes, and retrace its steps.

The gauges of the pipe line people published yesterday morning give the estimated production of the field as 21,000, and to-day it is given as 24,000 a jump of 3,000 barrels. This is due to three wells which are added to the list of those making 30 barrels an hour or more.

They are the Oakdale Oil Company's No. 2 on the Morgan farm, which was shot and brought up to 25 barrels an hour. It is at the well and 25th range. Both of the others are new and are Gordon Sanders, located in the Meise pool. They are the Forest Oil Company's No. 2 on the Mrs. Campbell farm, which was increased yesterday from 30 to 35 barrels an hour, and the other is Forest & Greenlee's No. 1 on the Mrs. Greenlee farm, which is making 30 barrels an hour.

The latter is 300 feet southwest of the Meise and the Campbell wells is 1,000 feet north of it, thus showing that a good-sized Gordon sand pool exists in that locality. Its ultimate dimensions are a matter of conjecture entirely.

Another Showing in the Gordon.

The Forest Oil Company's No. 1 on the John McEwen farm, located between the Campbell well and those at Willow Grove, was four bits in the sand at noon yesterday and made a flow. As the first day in this territory is not usually struck until they have run seven or eight bits in the sand, the owners did not expect to get the calibre of the venture until this morning. Their No. 1 on the Robert Wallace farm, in the same district is down 800 feet.

The Forest Oil Company, J. M. Guffey and Kenneth's No. 3 on the J. E. Wain farm, in the McCurdy end of the field, may get the fifth sand to-day. Lynch & Co. are drilling No. 2 and 3 on the Meise farm. No. 1 is still making 25 barrels an hour.

Forest & Greenlee's No. 3 on the Marshall & Chaifant lease just southwest of Noblesville, may be flowing to-day.

The Devonian Oil Company's No. 2 Moorhead, southwest of McDonald station, has been drilled to the fifth sand, which was barren of oil. The well is good for 100 to 200 barrels a day from the fourth sand. It was drilled on the 10th.

The Wheeling Gas Company's No. 1 Robbins, which is a good gasser, and about ten barrels of oil a day, was also struck this week. They are down 800 feet on the 3rd.

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STOLE HIS WIFE'S LOVE.

The Charge Made by Gabriel Kircher Against Joseph Stadleman—Another Side to the Story—The Grand Jury's Work—News of the Courts.

The suit of Gabriel Kircher against Joseph Stadleman was tried before Judge Stone yesterday. The case was an action for damages for the alleged alienation of the affection of Kircher's wife. All the parties are young and Mrs. Kircher is a very pretty little woman. Kircher lived on Webster avenue and alleged that all was peaceful and happy in his household until Stadleman came. The latter kept a butcher shop and located his shop in the lower story of the house occupied by Kircher. Stadleman, it is charged, fell in love with Mrs. Kircher and alienated her affections from her husband. Stadleman and Mrs. Kircher ended by going to live together. The other side of the story was that Kircher abused his wife and ill-treated her. Stadleman sympathized with his neighbor's pretty wife and his sympathy was directed to the little woman. The mutual feeling eventually became warmer and one day when Kircher was up his wife's room for Germany, not telling his wife where he was going and leaving her and their child unprepared for, she and Stadleman concluded to go and live together. When Kircher came back he so found them and sued for damages. The jury is out.

TOM WHITTAKER ESCAPES.
