COUNTERACTING THE EFFORTS OF THE NEW YORK BEARS.

Foreign Selling Depresses Louisville and Nashville - Distillers' Driven Down-Coalers, Including Reading, Settle Down

to Duliness-Most Stocks Close Lower. NEW YORK, June 16 .- The stock market was more quiet to-day than for some time, but there was no diminution in the efforts to get prices down, and in a few cases marked suc cess attended the drives. The market, as a whole, however, was barren of interest, and while the buying power was still lacking the stubbornness of prices was never more ap-parent. The realizations among the lighter bulls continued with some selling by Lon-don, but the Chicago favorites were still

don, but the Chicago favorites were still the leaders of the market, and the desire to cover in them was urgent enough to resist the hammering operations of the local beers. The foreign selling was accommonied by a decided drop in Louisville and Nashville, but there is no real evidence that the selling orders in that stock didn't have their origin on this side of the Atlantic: and the weak-ness was without serious influence upon the rest of the list. 


