LEGISLATORS NOT AMBITIOUS.

Politics of Mors Interest to Congress Than Public Affairs.

WASHINGTON, June 16 .- The attention of the Senate to-day was devoted to three important subjects. The bill for the free coin-nge of silver occupied the first place, both in point of time and importance. Next to it came the question of the reference of the House anti-option bill, and finally the con-ference report on the rivers and harbors bill occupied the closing two hours of the session. The silver bill was discussed by Mr. Morrill, who was replied to by Mr. Stew art, and it went over without action. It was expected that the reference of the antioption bill would provoke a somewhat bitter controversy, but that expectation was not verified. After a short discussion it was

referred to the Judiciary Committee, Mr Washburn stating to the friends of the bill that he had ascertained that the bill would not be delayed in that committee, but would be reported as promptly as possible, so that before the adjournment of this session the Senate would have an opportunity of pass-ing upon this question in which the whole country (outside of the gambling institu-tions of Chicago and New York and a few commercial contexts was a desmit intercommercial centers) was so deeply inter-ested. The conference report on the river and harbor bill was made by Mr. Frye, who ested. The conference report on the river and harbor bill was made by Mr. Frye, who stared that an agreement had been reached on all but two amendments-which were for the boat railway around the Dalles of the Columbia river, and for a canal in the State of Washington vith those of Puget Sound. After a long discussion the Senate insisted on its amendments, and agreed to a further conference and then the Senate adjourned until Monday next. Notwithstanding the fact that the tin plate bill engrossed the entire time of the House to-day, little attention was paid to the delate. The exodus to Chicago had be-gun, and the return from Minneapolis slow, when a Democrat was speaking he would have an audience of aboat 50 Democratic members; when he ceased this andience would disappear; and on the other side a similar number of members would raily to listen to their champion. 
