the train left on its return to New York.

The committee arrived at White Plains about 11:15 o'clook, and proceeded at once to Mr. Reid's residence. They were cordially received by Mr. Reid, and at once proceeded to the business of the day. Senator Dubois made the speech of notification. The Speech of Notification.

"Mr. Reid—The National Republican Convention, recently held in Minneapolis, selected a representative from each State and Territory from among its delegates to notify you that the great Republican party of the nation had selected you as its candidate for Vice President of the United Speaking for them, it is now my pleasing duty to give you that formal noti fication.
"This honor, one of the highest which a

free and thoughtful people can bestow, came to you unsought and with a unanimity rarely witnessed. The securing of a market is the ultimate object of all nations in modern politics, and your success in that great field will command for you the hearty approval of the producers of the United States. Mr. Reid Makes a Reply.

SCUDDER SCOOTS From This World Into the Next by the Morphine Route-The Physician Mur-

dorer Had Saved Doses Dally Until He Accumulated Sufficient for Suic CHICAGO, June 21 .- Dr. Henry Martin Scudder, the physician charged with the murder of his mother-in-law, Mrs. Mary Dunton, and who was awaiting trial in the County jail, died from the effects of a dose of morphine, apparently self-administered with suicidal intent, at an early hour this

The doctor had been in good spirits during the day, reading and talking with the jail attendants, and seeming very obserful in manner. At 8:30 the door of his cell was locked for the night. Soon afterward two of the night warders heard a series of deep groans issuing from the cell, and on enter-ing they discovered Dr. Soudder in a dying condition. At 12:30 Dr. Soudder died with-

condition. At 12:30 Dr. Scudder died without having regained consciousness.

George Painter, a condemned murderer who occupied the next cell to that of Dr. Scudder, said that the latter had been given morphine frequently in small quantities by the physician who had been attending him. From remarks he had heard the doctor make, Painter thinks he had been saving the doses of morphine until he had accumulated a sufficient quantity to end his life.

The object of the murder, it was claimed by the prosecution, was a determination to put her out of the way after having forged her will, so that Scudder's wife would become her principal heir. Mrs. Dunton's skull was crushed by a heavy wooden club. Insanity was the ples offered, and the case was several times continued in the Criminal Court to secure testimony on the point from

Court to secure testimony on the point from witnesses in India, where the doctor lived with his father, who was attained there as a missionary. His trial was set for July.
