This points to total ex-ports of wheat, including flour as wheat, of 217,000,000 bushels during the past 12 months, as compared with 105,000,000 bushels in the cereal year ending June 33, 1991.

The Failures for Six Months,

There have been 5,351 business failures in the United States within six months, 686 fewer than in the first half of 1891, a decrease of 11 per cent. Contrasted with six months of 1890, the decrease is only 115, or 2 per cent. Aggregate liabilities tell away to \$56,533,000 Aggregate induities fell away to \$56,533,000 this year, or 38 per cent less than in the first haif of 1891, and 10 per cent less than in a like portion of 1890. From this if is seen that a larger proportion of the failures this year are of smaller concerns than in 1891 or 1890. There were only three more failures with \$100,000 inhibities each in the past six months than in 1820, but aggregate inhibities of this class of embarrassments in 1892 are of this class of embarrassments in 1892 are 15 per cent smaller than in 1890, and 62 per

In spite about the smallest for nive years. In spite of low prices, additional works are going into operation, even in iron high reacture, and yet more in woolen and cotton. 




