Rev. Dr. David Gregg Freaches From a Presbyterian Pulpit.

LAST SERVICE IN THE OLD CHURCH.

Rev. S. W. McCorkle, at the First Congregational Church of Allegheny, last evening delivered a patriotic sermon. The church was crowded, but especial interest attached to the attendance of the First Allegheny company of the Boys' Brigade. These young men, 50 strong, marched into the church and filed into reserved seats near

The Boys' Brigade is a new religious military organization which is bound to attract great attention in the United States. Not one person in a thousand who yesterday morning read in the church announcements that this brigade would attend Rev. McCorkle's service knew what was meant.

The Boys' Brigade was started in Glasgow, Scotland, a few years ago, by a man bearing the name of Smith, who desired to secure some tie to bind the young men to the Sabbath school and church after they reach the age of 14 or 15. It is at this age that most boys lose their interest in the Sabbath school lessons and prefer togo fishing rather than study the Bereau leaf.

A Brigade of Youthful Soldiers. Taking advantage of the love of every boy for a military drill, the Boys' Brigade was formed, to be composed of youths from the age of 14 to the age of 18, who should bind themselves to attend the Sabbath services, and at the same time should be made a member of a military company

made a member of a military company which should enjoy the privileges of public drill, in neat uniforms, before the eyes of admiring friends.

This organization secured instant favor among the Sabbath school workers of the United Kingdom, and there are now in the British Isles 400 companies with a membership of over 20,000 well-drilled young men. This organization was introduced into the United States two years ago, taking its root in San Francisco, where the national headquarters now are. Several companies have been formed in Boston and New York City. The First Pitisburg Company.

A few months ago the First Pittsburg Company was organized at the Wylie Avenue U. P. Church, of which Rev. W. H. Knox is the pastor. It now has a membership of 100, with Captain J. A. A. Brown as drillmaster.

with Captain J. A. A. Brown as drillmaster. The boys wear a neat uniform of dark blue and drill with remarkable accuracy.

The second company in this county, and, in fact, in the State—for the scheme has not yet aroused interest in Philadelphia—was formed last Friday evening at the First Congregational Church, in Allegheny, and is called the First Allegheny Company. There is a membership of 59. Captain Brown attended the first meeting and gave the lads their preliminary drill. Frank E. Burkhart, of the Eighteenth Regiment, was elected captain and drillmaster. The boys have not yet been uniformed, but they soon will be at the expense of the church. The brigade is non-sectarian, and other companies will be formed in the churches of the two cities.

THE FUTURE LIFE.

Our Capacity for Enjoyment in Heaver Depends on How We Live Here.

Rev. Dr. David Gregg, successor to Rev. Theodore Cuyler, of Brooklyn, preached at the union service of the First and Third Presbyterian congregations at the First Church on Wood street yesterday. This is the first time Dr. Gregg has appeared in a Pitsburg pulpit since he severed his connection some years ago with the Covenanter Church. He looks a little like the late Henry Ward Beecher, and he is a forcible preacher. Ward Beecher, and he is a forcible preacher. He took for his text I Corinthians, iii., 12, 13, rd, 15: "Now if any man build upon this foundation gold, silver, precious stones, wood, hay, stubble; every man's work shall be made manifest for the day shall declare it, because it shall be revealed by fire, and the fire shall try every man's work of what sort it is. If any man's work abide which he hath built thereupon, he shall receive a reward.

fire shall try every man's work of what sort it is. If any man's work abide which he lath built thereupon, he shall receive a reward. If any man's work shall be burned, he shall suffer loss; that he himself shall be saved, yet so as by fire."

The Doctor's subject was the Christian's capacity for enjoyment in heaven. He said it depended entirely upon the religious development in this life. The future life is measured by the life led upon earth. Those living pure and good lives, the highest and best, would have a greater capacity for enjoyment than the people who had just been religious enough to get into heaven. The Christian would come face to face with God and enjoy personal intercourse with Him. Others with a less degree of capacity would probably only get a hand shake. He explained his meaning by an intellectual comparison. When such men as Emerson and Carlyle, Humboldt and Agassiz met they would have a universe to talk about. They had the minds to march out and grasp a world of ideas. On the other hand two grangers as they came together would chat about the crops.

The Doctor held that the gold, silver, precious stones, etc., in the text are symbolic and intended to show the kind of life lived upon earth. The gold representing the highest and most enduring and the others standing for lesser degrees. The bay and stubble represent the works that are burned, leaving nothing but ashes. It is the poorest life that guarantees admission to Heaven.

Dr. W. J. Reid Speaks of Evils That Menne the Republic.

Dr. W. J. Reid Speaks of Evils That Mennee the Republic.

Dr. W. J. Reid preached a very timely sermon yesterday to his congregation in the First U. P. Church. His subject was, "The Christian's Fourth of July." The doctor pointed out that the Passover was the Hebrew memorial day, and it was observed to celebrate the delivery of the children of Israel from Egyptian bondage. From this he argued that it was the duty of nations to properly observe their anniversary days to revive patriotism and make citizens proud of their country. He then showed how the American republic is an example of the grace of God, and he commended the wisdom of the early fathers in framing a constitution that called for religious liberty.

The doctor then dealt with the dangers that menace the American people. These are immigration, intemperance, Sabbath desecration, political ambition and the confict between labor and capitat. Dr. Reid is not in the habit of mincing words, and he was very emphatic and straightforward in what he had to say on these subjects. He denounced the conduct of the great political parties as cowardly in their treatment of the immigration question. He thought the time had arrived for sweeping restrictions. Dr. Reid claims that the country has about all the ignorant foreigners that can be handled, and a hait should be called to give the people a chance to be assimilated. This will require some years. He was afraid if the influx of undesirable immigrants continued much longer that the republic was in great danger of being overthrown. He favors the absolute restriction of the ignorant classes in general, the paupers, idoots, criminals, insane and all ment of the immigration question. He thought the time had arrived for sweeping restrictions. Dr. Reid claims that the country has about all the ignorant foreigners that can be handled, and a hait should be called to give the people a chance to be assimilated. This will require some years.
