FAST TRAIN DERAILED.

The Chicago Limited Jumps From the Tracks at Glenfield,

RUNNING 60 MILES AN HOUR.

Miraculous Escape of All on Board, Not One

CHARGED TO FAULTY SWITCH-SETTING

Being Injured.

As the New York and Chicago limited was nearing Pittsburg yesterday morning it left the track at Glenfield, and the whole train was derailed. Although the train was running at very high speed, nearly 60 miles an hour, and every car but one left the track, nobody was hurt and comparatively little damage was done to the rolling stock, though the track was badly cut up.

The accident has not been fully accounted for yet, but the known facts appear to be as follows: The limited was running about on time and making very high speed, close to 60 miles an hour, when it rushed through Glenfield station at a little before 7 o'clock yesterday morning. As the locomotive cleared the station it jumped the track and dragged with it all of the five cars of the train but the last.

Supposed Faulty Setting of the Switch, At the point where the accident occurred the two tracks spread out into three, and the east-bound passenger trains commonly use the center track, the outer east-bound track being devoted to freight traffic. The center track is entered from the west by a switch, and it is supposed that faulty set-ting of this switch caused the accident. It is understood, though not with absolute certainty, that the operator in the signal tower at Glenfield discovered when he heard the limited approaching that the switch had not been set to divert the train into the center track, and tried to rectify the mistake. It is concluded that he did not complete the operation properly, or that at all events the switch did not close properly, leaving the point of the switch in such a position that the flange of the locomotive's wheel struck it, and the shock, combined with the high speed at which the train was going, threw the big engine off the track.

The engineer, it is said, saw that the switch was out of place before he reached

it, and was thus able to prepare for the acci-dent though he could not abute the train's The woncer is that the train did not suf-fer more. All the cars left the track except the observation car, which was the last, but

there was no telescoping or toppling over, the locomotive was little damaged, the combination smoker and baggage car next to it suffered more than the rest, while the sleeper tollowing was dragged for half its length off its trucks. Not a Man on Board Injured.

Neither engineer nor fireman was hurt, and the 50 oild passengers in the train got nothing worse than an awful fright and a good shaking. The engine and cars bumped over the ties for a few bundred feet and stopped right side up. The passengers, most of whom were dressed, or dressing scrambled out of the cars and thanked their stars it was no worse. A train made up in Pittsburg, which was soon sent out, enabled the limited's passengers to con-

tinue their journey.

Fortunately the wreck did not blockade the west-bound track, although both the eastern tracks were put out of service till last night, and the traffic of the road was conducted with some incidental delays over single trock between Glenfield and Sc wickley. Railroad men noticed that the Cavalier, boudoir car, was once more in trouble. It was a part of the limited when that train was wrecked at East Palestine. Superingendeut A.
