PLANS OF BIGELOW

Explained to the Park Committee While Out in Carriages.

A SHELTER HOUSE AT HIGHLAND.

An Observatory at Schenley and a Driving Track Around It.

COMMITTEE SURPRISED AND PLEASED

The visit of the Park Committee to Highland and Schenley parks yesterday was a pleasant and profitable one to the 14 members of the committee who attended. Business prevented the attendance of Mayor Gourley and Controller Morrow, It was the first trip for several of the members to either of the parks, and great was their surprise as they viewed the city's great playgrounds. Chief Bigelow acted the role of guide with assiduous attention to details. He met the committee and a few 2-3wspaper men with carriages at the tot of Highland avenue and drove lirect to Highland, the Chief's favorite of the parks. The numerous long driveways here were carefully traversed, the improvements already made explained and noted, and the splendid views of the Alletheny valley obtainable from Mt. Bigelow were greatly enjoyed. Then the newly acquired tracts of land were inspected and the Chief and Superintendent Paislev explained to the committee the improvements they intend to make. They told of the broad driveway which will begin at Stauton avenue east of Highland avenue and run down brough the Negley run ravine until it trikes the old water basin, the top of which will be cut down a few feet to adapt to the grade and formed into a broad riveway, the bottom of the basin being nade a pretty little lake.

A Shelter for Picule Parties. Up in the ravine there is an old mausion

touse which is being remodeled to form a helter for the piccic parties who visit the oark daily, and the broad piazzas that are eing built around the old dwelling will take it an attractive retreat at all times. Before leaving the park the Chief took he visitors to view the Fite and Fline roperties fronting on Highland avenue. o skillfully did he explain the necessity of dding them to the park in order to secure respectable entrance that one or two memers of the party who had previously op-osed the purchases enthusiastically delared in favor of them.
Superintendent Mck night ceremoniously

eleomed the visitors on arrival at Scheney Park and thereafter became their escort. ere were three large Sunday school pic iles scattered through the groves and rehards, and on being intermed that this vas an almost daily occurrence the visitors vere astonished that in such a short time his park had become so popular. Nothing rorth seeing escaped attention. Every nain driveway was traversed in carriages nd some of the new bridle paths on the outh hill were tramped over.

Stone Quarry in the Park,

The handsome retaining wall being built in the west hill of stone quarried in the park and the system of road building being oursued were examined and tavorably commented on. The extent of the stone quarries and the bustle and activity displayed there were a revelation to most of the visitors and were examined with interest. All other points of interest and imrovement operations were sim-arly inspected, and, while a tasty incheon was being served to the committee it the orchard on the most elevated point in the park, future developments were talked of and Chief Bigelow unfolded some of his

One which will probably be exe-uted this year is a half-mie driv-ng track which will be formed on the crest of the south hill from which he Court House, the East End Valley, Oak-and, the Southside and the Monongahela Valley may all be seen by simply turning he head. With very little expense this penutiful hilltop can be converted into a plendid oval track, and in the center of the val space there is projected an observatory imilar to that at Fairmount Park, Philatelphia, from which the view of the surounding country will be greatly increased.

Why a Driving Park Is Needed. The pecessity for a driving track in the park, as explained by Mr. Bigelow, is that here are so many fast horses in this city and no place to speed them. It is as natural or a man to speed a good horse as it is for he animal to eat, and at present, having no ther place, the owners use the park drivevays to test their nags in spite of the viglance of the police. This is not only langerous to the life and limb of thers but disagreeable to those who lesire to jog along and enjoy themselves justly. By providing the fast drivers a rack, as other cities are doing in their arks, there will be no excuss for the use of arks, there will be no excuse for the use of he driveways for that purpose and it will erve to popularize the park in other ways. Before leaving the park the committee as treated to the spectacle of the big dephant taking his daily bath in the pond. At the oval where the athletic contests took lace on the Fourth the amphitheater seats re still in position and Chief Bigelow is naking preparations for another series of ontests to take place some Saturday afteroon or evening before the building of the ew conservatory is begun. Prof. Kirscher, of the East End Gyms, will probably e called upon to superintend the arrangements. The idea met with the hearty favor f the Park Committee, who left the park ast evening enthusiastic over the question f public breathing spots.
