It Is Decided Unconstitutional to Slaughter Canines.

ALLEGHENY'S ORDINANCE VETOED. is located northwest of Oakdale a couple of Have No More Right to Remove Them Than

to Burn Property.

THE CITY IS LIABLE FOR DAMAGES

Canines of Allegheny City and of the whole State, in fact, may henceforth bay at the moon unmolested and laugh at the dog catcher and his net. They may make night hideous and have nothing more to fear than the gentle zephyrs or the soothing whir of the passing bootjack. Allegheny's City Solicitor has decided it unconstitutional to kill dogs.

On the strength of this opinion Mayor Kennedy, of Allegheny, yesterday vetoed the ordinance providing for the licensing of dogs and the establishment of a pound. The ordinance was passed by both branches of Councils some time ago, and approved by Chief Murphy, of the Department of Publie Safety. When it was given to Mayor Kennedy for his approval, he turned the matter over to the City Solicitor for his

Mr. Elphinstone completed his opinion yesterday and on the strength of it the ordinance was vetoed. Mr. Elphinstone was of the opinion there was no legal right to kill unlicensed dogs. He says dogs are property and a city has no more right to till them for non-payment of taxes than they would have to burn down a man's iouse for the same neglect.

Pittsburg People Can Get Damages. He further held that people who have had dogs killed in Pittsburg by the city authorities can bring action for damages and repover. The opinion is as follows: Hon, William M. Kennedy, Mayor of the City of

DEAR SIR-I am in receipt of your request for an opinion as to the legality of the recent ordinance imposing a license fee or tax upon the owners of dogs, and providing

have given the subject the serious considcruel destruction of canines, that the authority to enact such legislation should

The ordinance cannot be sustained upon

The ordinance cannot be sustained upon any delegation of police power given to Conneils in the charter of the city or in any other act of Assembly. As we shall presently see, such legislation, even if it did exist, would be unconstitutional.

The ordinance fixes a license fee and provides that any dog found running at large without the license plate (such plate being evidence that the fee has been paid) shall be impounded, and if its owner does not appear within 48 hours and pay the fee and cost of the impounding of the animal that it shall forthwith be destroyed.

No Power to Kill Dogs. The charter of the city of Allegheny (Act of April 1, 1870,) chapter 3, section 7, provides that the Councils shall have power "to prevent the running at large of dogs, and in-juries or annoyances therefrom, and to au-thorize the destruction of the same when at large." It cannot be contended that the or-dinance in question is sought to be enacted in pursuance of this legislation, or that in any sense or to any extent it is warranted thereby.

A dog is as much at large with a metal plate attached to his collar as a dog without such an ornament. Unless indeed the license plate should be made heavy enough to prevent a dog from running at effectually stop the peripatetic canine from gamboling along the high-ways of the city, it would fit the same time be a most flagrant violation of constitutional rights. Under section 9, article 1, of the Constitution of 1574, no man can be deprived of his life, liberty or independence or property unless by the cates opened at 525c; highest 523c. 1874, no man can be deprived of his life, lib-crity or independence or property unless by the judgment of his peers or the law of the land. It has always been held that there was sufficient property in a dog, registered or annegistered, on which to found a civil action. It is true that unless registered they could not be the subject of larceny.

Liable for Every Canine Killed, This is the law to-day and I believe the city would be liable to the owner for the value of every dog destroved under the ordinance in question. The Constitution provides that a man cannot be deprived of s property without due process of law. It rannot be contended that the dog catcher with his net, ambulance and drowning apparatus constitutes the due process of law. We have no more right to kill an unlicensed dog because his permit to live, or rather his annual tax, has not been paid,

than we would have to destroy a merchant's goods because he had not paid his business The penalty for the violation of an ordi-The pennity for the violation of an ordi-nance providing for the taxing of does must be sued for and collected as other like pen-alties are recovered. The act of June 10, lest contains the same provisions as our city contrier, and is open to the same ob-

s. udinance does not fix a uniform tax; le dog is charged \$1, the female \$2, and the ordinance provides illegal destruction and confiscation of property. and confiscation of property.

I advise you to send it back to Councils with your veto.

Mayor Kennedy said last evening: "My voto will be given simply because of the Solicitor's opinion that the killing of a dog is the destruction of personal property, for which the owner may recover. The ordi-nance may be fixed up in some satisfactory manner. The payment of a tax is a good thing, if some constitutional penalty can he attached for non-payment. It might be collected like any other delinquent tax."
