Since the Departure of Russian Troops to Pamir Not Enough Are Now LEFT TO PRESERVE ORDER.

ONE DEATH IN ST. PETERSBURG.

St. Petersburg, Aug. 3.—One death has occurred here from Asiatic cholera.

Cholera has appeared in the Government of Kurak, in the southern part of European Russia.

After the suppression of the riots in Tashkent several thousand insurgents fled from the city.

The Governor General of Turkistan refuses to send reinforcements to Ferghana.

In consequence of the prevalence of cholera in Russia the Ministry of Education has issued an order that all schools in the country shall remain closed until September 1.

A dispatch from Berlin says: The issue of passports from Breslau and other frontier places to Russia has been restricted.

PALACIO IN PARIS.

He Still Claims to Be the Only Legal President of Venezuela—He Was Not Forced to Leave His Country—Says Crespo Is Routed.

Paris, Aug. 3.—The ex-President of Venezuela, Dr. Raimundo Andrades Palacio, is still in Paris, accompanied by his family.

TWO SEATS QUESTIONED.
