LOCAL DEALERS ADVANCE LARD PRICES

SATURDAY, Aug. 6. A more cheerful tone developed in the local commercial world during the week ending to-day, as the result of (1) the belief that the trouble at the Carnegie mills would ultimately be adjusted without any further serious disturbances of the peace, (2) that the crops would be such as to bring prosperity to the agricultural

interests, and (3) that money would be easy throughout the remainder of the year. There was, however, no very noticeable degree of activity in any branch of trade, though dealers in groceries and hog products reported a free movement at firm prices. The duliness and monotony so long prevalent in the grain and feed trade were relieved somewhat by a slight revival in the demand, due in the main to a produce commission men reports continued to note an unsatisfactory condition of af-mirs, both as to the volume of business and range of prices. In other mercantile lines a fair movement for the season was enjoyed, but noteworthy features, like angels' visits, were lew and far between.

Crop Prospects. Crops promise to be very favorable, and as the crop outlook has much to do with the business of the country we can expect prosperity during the fall and winter. Wheat d corn are the only leading crops which have begun to move in large quantities have begun to move in large quantities out rice and cotton will soon follow. Although we are not likely to have too much, as last year, we will have enough wheat to supply our needs and plenty to spare for loreign consumption. We will not have as much corn as last season. The cotton crop will be a short one owing to reduction in acreage and weather conditions, but there is nothing in this to cause dolefulness, as last year's enormous surplus proved more harmful than beneficial. The rice acreage is the largest ever planted, the season has been a splendid one and unless dison his been a splendid one and unless dis-strous storms come up within the next few reeks the crop will be a magnificent one, a desire for profit from the bounty system has caused an increased sugar cane acreage has caused an increased sugar cane acreage and a large crop is assured.






