Fight Million Dollars' Worth Owned by Church Bodies.

ITEMIZED STATEMENT OF EXEMPTIONS

For the first time in the history of this city the Board of Assessors have made up a list with the cash value of all properties exempted from municipal taxation. The list was given out for publication by Chief Assessor Case last evening. It shows that the actual cash value of exempted property within the city, as nearly as the assessors could determine, is \$32,991,776. The taxable value, making allowance for that which is rated as rural at two-thirds its value and that which is agricultural at half its value, amounts to \$31,301,070.

The preparation of such a list was suggested and attempted a year ago, but proved such a formidable task that it was abandoned. When the triennial assessment was made up there were so many appeals for exemption on properties of various kinds which the assessors thought should not be exempted, that they decided to have a list prepared to show why no more exemptions should be allowed. The total, large as it is, is somewhat of a disappointment to them. They expected it to be larger.

Difficulty in Fizing Valuations.

They say it is as complete as they could possibly make it. If any property has been omitted it is because they know nothing about it. The only item they knowingly omitted was the city wharves. They found it exceedingly difficult to estimate a value for wharf property and it was a question whether they could properly be figured as city property.

In hunting up the valuation of the Highland reservoir and Brilliant pumping station, it was found that the city had little, if any, record to show of their cost. Superintendent Wilcox, of the Water Bureau, has been vainly endeavoring to get some accurate figures on this point for some time. There seems to be no record anywhere as to the cost of the land in bulk or by the acre, though the Controller thinks that by making a long search through the records in his office the figures might be obtained. The figures placed upon that property are estimated from the recent sales as shown in the city deed registry.

One item which appears as exempt from city tax is the property of the Allegheny County Light Company. It is valued at \$91,980. The company claims exemption because its capital stock is taxed for State purposes and since it has been exempted other corporations have demanded the same privilege on the same grounds.

The Controller Will Look It Up. Controller' Morrow says the light company is not entitled to exemption. All corporations paying a State tax are, he says, exempt from city business tax, but no other, and if there is any law that could be twisted

The total value of convents, monasteries, seminaries and libraries exempted is \$688,700, of which \$525,230 is rated full, and \$163,470 rural. The aggregate value of chari-table institutions is \$651,890, of which \$628,565 is rated full, and \$23,325 rural. Hospitals aggregate \$805,650 in value, \$653,270 being full and the balance rural. The value of cemeteries aggregates \$1,964,196. The balk of this sum is repre-sented by the Allegheny Cemetery. A rural valuation is given to \$998,000 of ceme-tery property, agricultural \$303,300 and full taxable \$662,896. Held by Religious Bodies. taxable \$662.896.

The assessors estimated the value of the The assessors estimated the value of the rights of way of the various steam railroads in the city at \$1,748,323. This is divided up in the appended list in the various wards. Of the total \$1,438,679 is rated as full taxable, \$307,544 as rural and \$2,100 as agricultural property. The rights of way of the inclined plane roads are estimated at \$37,991, of which \$32,211 is rated full and \$5,780 rural. Many More Claims for Exemptions.

Many More Claims for Exemptions. There are before us claims for exemptions from numerous corporations, among them the Allegheny Light Company, Pittsburg Gas Company, Consolidated Gas Company, East End Gas Company, the West End Gas Company and the Monongahela Water Com-pany. These and other like corporations claim exemption for their property because the State collects a tax on their capital stock. The attorney of the Monongahela Water Company, for instance, claims that all of the property used in the pumping and distribu-tion of water is exempt from local tax. The same claim is being made by the other com-panies.

tion of water is exempt from local tax. The same claim is being made by the other com-panies. The latest claim for exemption, appar-ently sustained by State and Supreme Coart decisions, is that of the Shady Side Academy. We have pre-emptorily declined to allow the elaim and the city attorneys have been instructed to resist it in the courts if necessary. A tuition fee of at least \$1 a day is charged for each pupil at that school and the institution does not come under what we consider properly exempted property. We are determined to get a court decision on this point before allowing it. The aggregate of exempted property may astonish taxpayers, but it will be found less than in other large citles of the country. The city, county, public school, United States Government, church and cemetery properties aggregate \$20,753,566 in cash value, leaving a balance covering elemosynary in-stitutions of \$3,538,220. This is a less sum for that class than we had anticipated.

about it. The Controller intimates that he will investigate the matter and if he finds that he is right will insist on the light company paying city tax on its property the same as the traction and railroad and

other corporations. The total valuation of property belonging to the municipality, including the parks, market houses, City Hall, the fire and po-lice stations, etc., but not including public-schools, amounts to \$7,269,886. Of this \$5,866,619 is rated as full taxable; \$603,267 us rural, and \$800,000 as agricultural, refer-ring to the parks. 
