





Machines of the latter class are called "motors," those of the former "generators." The demand for information as to the meaning of electrical terms is rapidly increasing, and this demand has led

rapidly increasing, and this demand has led to the recent publication of an electrical dictionary which explains all the electrical

dictionary which explains all the electrical terms at present in general use. This book will be of service to the laymen as well as to the growing number of students who choose electrical studies at our larger universities and technical schools.
