WASHINGTON, Aug. 23.—Secretary Charles Foster intimated today that there was to be some sort of a new deal in regard to the appointment of an immigrant inspector to specially have supervision of the importation of glassworkers, but would give no suggestion of the character of whatever is held in contemplation.

"The Democrats are splitting up in the South as they are in the North.
