

ODONNELL UP AGAIN.

The Leader of the Homestead Workmen Charged with Murder, ASKS A SECOND TIME FOR BAIL. Newspaper Reporters Called to Tell of the Folly of It.

BAUER AND NOED AGAIN INDICTED.

High O'Donnell, the recognized leader of the locked-out men at Homestead, had a hearing before Judge Porter yesterday afternoon...

When led into the courtroom by a burly officer O'Donnell looked about him like one thoroughly frightened. There were two to that for, however, the prisoner bowed politely and made an effort at smiling.

O'Donnell as Handsome as Ever.

He looked remarkably robust. His heavy black mustache, shining like a raven's wing, was curled back from his positive mouth.

It was just 1:30 in the afternoon when the court opened. Without any preliminaries Captain Brock opened the case and read to the court all the evidence taken when O'Donnell was admitted to bail several weeks ago.

Captain Aul, formerly a DISPATCH reporter, was the first witness. He testified to being with a man named Boyle, of Homestead, who was in Pittsburgh on the night of July 5, watching for Pinkertons.

A Telegram to Homestead. The witness then went with Boyle to a telegraph office where Boyle wrote a telegram. It read: "Watch the river; steamer is coming with boxes."

Walter J. Christ, a DISPATCH reporter, the next witness, told of Boyle's coming into the DISPATCH office and asking to have some one sent with him to watch the Pinkerton's.

H. Tanner, formerly a DISPATCH reporter, was the next witness, and for over an hour occupied the stand. He told of the arrangements made among the strikers to divide the work of keeping non-union workmen.

H. R. Layton, the Pittsburgh representative of the Chicago Tribune, saw O'Donnell in the Postal Telegraph Company's office on the night of July 6. He had a gun with him and threatened the witness' life.

Frank M. Gregg, of the Cleveland Press, was in the cupola in the afternoon of July 6 while the strikers were throwing the dynamite.

George J. Campbell, editor of the West Elizabeth Star, said he was present in the afternoon when the men were trying to pump oil on the barges.

John Gregg, a Times reporter at the time of the riot, was the last witness. He did not know anything new, and the hearing was continued until 9:30 o'clock this morning.

John McFarland, Jessie Lutz, Jacob Maizer and Archibald Grotz, four men of Homestead, arrested on Saturday for interfering with officers and workmen, appeared before Alderman McMasters yesterday morning and entered bail for a hearing at 11 o'clock this morning.

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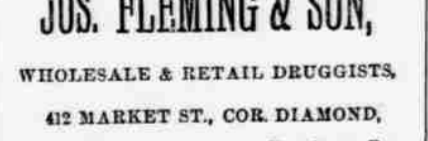
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
