All sales are ordered to be delivered as soon as we can turn the sugars out of our refineries. This mouth is always a very busy one, and the demand for granulated sugar is very great; this has undoubtedly been increased this year by the 'cholera scare.' We have always made it a rule to prevent specuation in high grade sugars, and it is for this reason we have adopted the plan of adjusting all orders. No one gets more than his share of sugar, and the price is kept at its old figure. We have plenty of sugar and all bona fide orders are being filled. 
