

A SLIGHT WAR SPECK

On the Horizon of Venezuela, That May Not Entirely Disappear

UNTIL SOME DAMAGE IS DONE.

Justice Lamar Not Likely to Resign Even if He is a Sick Man.

SYMPATHY EXPRESSED ON ALL SIDES

(FROM A STAFF CORRESPONDENT.)

WASHINGTON, Sept. 26.—It is admitted today at the Department of State that there is a possibility at any moment of trouble with Venezuela.

The news has been very meager from the representatives of the United States at Venezuela during the last few days, and it is not expected that any great profusion of information will be sent by Minister Scruggs or by Rear Admiral Walker.

Reasons for the Commotion. The insolence of the Venezuelans; their demand for contributions from foreigners for the maintenance of the Government;

It is somewhat peculiar that the attitude of the United States in this affair is the reverse of what it was at the outset of the troubles in Chile.

Walker's Instructions Are Peremptory. Whatever may be the wisdom or the lack of wisdom of the Minister, the duty of Rear Admiral Walker does not seem to demand that he should inquire into the politics of the country or the quarrels of its factions.

Admiral Walker, it is said by those who know him best, will not be averse to the trial of his guns if an occasion offers, and once he will make thorough work of it.

It is said by an authority at the State Department that it is expected almost the only thing that will stand in the way of serious trouble with the present usurper called the Government of Venezuela will be the speedy downfall of that faction engaged in successful mutiny, and the ascendancy of the faction which has General Crespo as the acknowledged leader.

Lamar Not Likely to Resign. Though the effects of the paralytic stroke from which the physician of Justice Lamar admit that notable gentleman suffered last week have apparently passed away, the subject of the early retirement of the justice from the bench of the Supreme Court is canvassed by every one who is at all interested in the matter.

Of course, Justice Lamar need not resign, even if he is incapacitated. He could hardly do less service to his country than he has in the past, even if he be compelled to remain away from the court altogether.

Great sympathy is expressed on all sides, regardless of party, on account of the physical wreck to which Justice Lamar has been reduced.

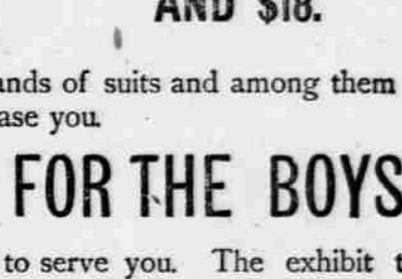
