GEORGE S. SOUTH. The chess fraternity of the two cities mourns the loss of one of its most useful members in the sudden and unexpected death of George S. South on Sunday night, October 3, from neuralgis of the heart. He was an active supporter of the game, and assisted materially in bringing it to its pres-ent stage of development in this vicinity. One of the originators of the Allegheny Chess Club, the strongest and most success-ful organization of its kind in Western Pennsylvania, he acted as its Secretary and was a member of its Executive Committee; and to his earnest and untiring efforts the club owns much of its success. He was also one of the originators of the Pennsylvania State Chess Association. State Chess Association. While he took a lively interest in all mat-

While he took a lively interest in all mat-ters relating to the game, he appeared to derive his chief pleasure in the problem de-partment. He was considered a good solver and in solving contests was always regarded as a dangerous antagonist. In the local solving tournaments his score invariably ranked among tue highest and beat. Personally Mr. South was one of the most delightful of companious, always good na-tured, always ready with pleasant repartee. His sudden and unexpected death has been a severe shock to his many friends, who sympathize deeply with the family in its bereavement.

The only well of any size is J. M. Guffey's No. 4, on the Shane farm, which was re-ported to be making 20 barrels an hour from the Gordon sand. It is located about a mile south and west of Willow Grove, and is only a short distance southwest of the old Meise No. 1.

There was no change in the estimated production of the McDonald field yesterday. It is still 21,000 barrels. There were two It is still 21,000 barrels. There were two wells dropped from the list of big ones. They are Clarke & Co.'s No. 3 on the Free-man lot and Greenlee & Forst's No. 3 Mar-shall. Each went below 20 barrels an hour. Greenlee & Forst's No. 2 Noble heirs fell from 35 to 25 barrels an hour. The Florence Oil Company shot its No. 7 on the Robb heirs' farm, south of Willow Grore, and last evening it was making 37 barrels an hour. Their No. 6 on the Robb property should get into the Gordon sand the last of next week. Oil in a Wildest Venture.




