WHEAT IS STRONG

On the Drouth in This Country and Russia -Corn and Oats a Little Lower and Hog

Products Quiet and About Steady. CHICAGO, Oct. 10 .- Enormous receipts proved powerless to-day to depress wheat. The Russian drouth and its American counterpart were the principal life-savers. Corn, in the absence of such substainers, had a moderate decline. October lard ernatically jumped up 25c, but otherwise pro-visions are 23035c lower than last night. Wheat shows a gain of 1/6% c and corn a loss of he for November, %e for December and kc for May. Local wheat receipts were much larger

Local wheat receipts were much larger than expected, the inspectors having worked Sunday, and the deliveries in the Northwest were prodigions-4,80 cars. In addition to this there was decided weakness in corn and the indications were that the visible supply would show an unexpectedly large increase. But these bearish factors were offset by reports that the crop situa-tion in Russia was critical; that there had been no rain for four months and the ground could not be plowed and that there was danger of a repetition of last year's funine. This was partially confirmed by a cable from London reporting an advance in Rus-sian wheat there of 6d. There was no sign of any break in the droith in the winter wheat districts of this country. The visible supply as finally reported showed an increase in wheat of 3,5,000 bush-els or 100,000 more than generally looked for.

The temperature for the last week in September was especially beneficial to com-merce.
