SOME INSTANCES OF DISCRIMINATION

The Chamber of Commerce yesterday took steps toward abolishing discrimination in freight rates against Pittsburgh.

The letter upon the subject read before the chamber some time ago by Robert J. Bailey was returned by the Committee on Transportation and Railroads without any recommendation.

A Freight Bureau Suggested.

In considering Mr. Bailey's letter in committee last Friday evening three hours were spent. It was the general opinion among the members that it was not for the Chamber of Commerce to undertake the expense of maintaining a bureau with a competent man in charge to look after the interests of the manufacturers.

A Drawback to Manufacturers.

It is a matter of common remark that while Allegheny county maintains the position which she holds for a generation as the great heavy manufacturing center of the United States, she is making little or no progress in finishing the materials which she produces.

What Cincinnati Has Secured.

I have read the report of an association of this kind organized in connection with the Cincinnati, Ohio, and Indiana, in the city of Cincinnati. It has been in operation only about two years, but has already accomplished important results, and its good work has begun.

A. M. Marshall had a 1,500 vacant houses in Allegheny, and people are going every day to the East End because they have more improvements, better streets, etc.

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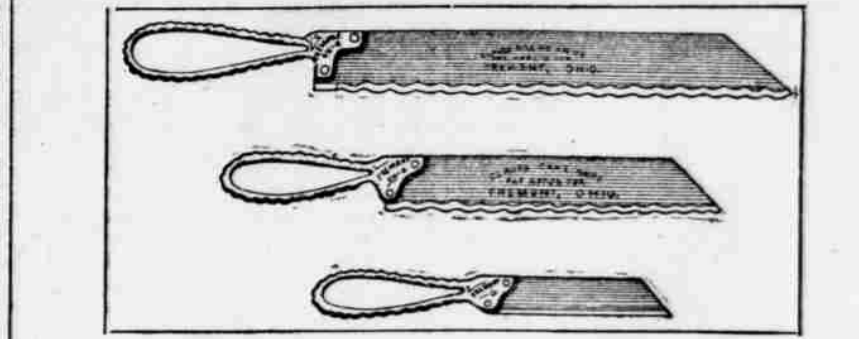
