A ROUNDUP IN CORN.

A Pool Evidently at Work to Advance the Price-Gain of a Full Cent-Wheat and Oats Sympathize With Corn and Hog Products Move Upward.

CHICAGO, Nov. 7 .- There was a roundup in the corn market to-day which looked like the work of a pool. The price was given a jump of over a cent in very short order When the advance was over the buyers on the way up were ready to take profits. With the receipts showing 487 cars, and nothing on the board about Sunday inspection, the market was started 1/2 higher for near months and steady for May around 45c. The withdrawals were very good at 481,000 bush-els. The weather over the entire corn shipping section was of the worst. The report about husking turning out poorly were on about husking turning out poorly were on the increase. Provisions were sensationally advanced and traders were nervous on the grain market. With these conditions, Schwartz-Dupee, Chaplin and a few others began buying furiously. They took proba-bly 1,000,000 busiels of corn in 30 minutes. It is rumored that the Pattons and Bartlett-Frazer, who are heavily short, were cover-ing. Smaller shorts were trigatened to cover on the advance. The market weak-ened a triffe on taking of profits but at the close corn, compared with Saurday night, showed a gain of le, outs ½¢, wheat ½¢. Pro-visions were advanced 22½¢ in the price of pork, 55¢ in November and 7½¢ in January and 10¢ in January ribs. The advance in wheat is in the face of the preatest visible supply on record. Then,




