

FINAL CLAIMS ON BOTH SIDES, Republicans Laughing at the Pretensions of Western Democrats.

SEVERAL WILD ESTIMATES Emanating from the Headquarters in Ben Cable's Control.

The Rainbow Chaser Says Illinois, Wisconsin and Iowa Are Certainly Democratic, and South Dakota Is Lost to Harrison—Republicans in Illinois Sure Their State Will Give the President a Big Plurality When He Had Last Time—A New Scheme in South Dakota That It Is Said Will Lose the State to Harrison—Both Indiana Chairmen Claiming the State by Big Plurality.

CHICAGO, Nov. 7.—The close of the campaign finds both political parties confident in the Northwest. The Democrats, for the most part, feel assured that they will elect their Governor in this State, and there are many who even expect the electoral vote of Illinois to be cast for Cleveland. The Republicans laugh at these pretensions, and their State Committee appears to be quite as confident of Republican victory all along the line in Illinois.

The Democratic National Campaign Committee, whose Western headquarters have been in charge of the campaign since the close of the Illinois election, sent out telegrams to all local committees in the Northwest, assuring them that a careful poll left no room for doubt of Cleveland's success in Illinois and Wisconsin, and all that remained was to get out the full Democratic vote to-morrow. This committee has practically managed the entire Democratic campaign in the doubtful States of the Northwest, and if one or more of these States should go Democratic, it will be justly regarded as a great victory for Chairman Cable and his colleagues, who have waged a contest without precedent in the West, and have made this fight without assistance from the National Committee.

Chairman Cable's Confident Claims. To the Associated Press Chairman Cable, of the Western branch of the National Campaign Committee, this evening gave the following statement of the committee's opinion of the situation in the Northwest and the part which the committee's work will have in the general result:

In Illinois the Democratic organization has never in better condition. There have been sent from these headquarters, in addition to more than 3,000,000 documents dealing with the question of the active work in the campaign, over 100,000 personal letters to individual Democrats throughout the State. These have been sent to those engaged in the active work of the campaign, and also to large numbers of business and professional men, school teachers, and to those who have been known as ardent Democrats, but pass the time of life when they can be expected to do the active work of a campaign. The responses have been more than encouraging.

From all parts of the State I have received letters showing that the Democrats are enthused with the prospect. The polls sent to this office show evidence of having been prepared with more than ordinary care. The special circulars issued by the National Campaign Committee, which were distributed last Saturday night, has been of vast service in building up our ticket the support of a large class of unattached voters who have been Republicans, but have agreed with the platform declaration rather than with party action in Congress.

What the Rest of the West May Do. From a careful examination of the polls received from the State I believe the two parties will come to Cook county very nearly even, and that the majority here will be over 10,000, and will give the State to Cleveland and will give to our ticket a plurality of 10,000. I have just received a dispatch from Hon. D. J. Campbell, Chairman of the Michigan State Committee, in which he says: "The Democracy of Michigan extends greetings. We will do our full duty. Eight electors, a majority of Congress and the State Legislature will be our reward." Mr. Campbell has been conservative in his statements during the campaign, and I believe the Democrats throughout the country can rely upon his predictions.

In South Dakota, though the Democratic supporters remain on the ticket, the State Committee has urged all Democrats to unite and support the Weaver electors, and this has been done in a large majority of cases. A dispatch just received from the Chairman of the Democratic Party in that State, under the assurance that his State is all right, and that the Weaver electors will have a fair plurality.

Even Wisconsin is Claimed. From Wisconsin Mr. Wall, Chairman of the State Committee, telephoned me this morning that he has no reason to change the estimate he made public last Saturday, of 15,000 outside of Milwaukee. He believes his estimate has been most conservatively made, and that the count will show even a larger gain than has been reported. He assures me that he is all over but the shouting.

In Iowa our friends have made a good fight and predict that they will carry the State. I feel that the present Republican admission that Iowa is fairly to be counted as a doubtful State is as much of a victory as I can claim for the party in a State which has been so overwhelmingly Republican. There is significance in the fact that the most conservative Democrats I know in the State have assured me personally within the last few days that they have given over the ground and feel confident that the State will be Democratic by a larger majority than has ever been given to the present Governor. I have confidence in their judgment, but have hesitated to accept their estimates until I have seen the evidence. In Illinois we have shown evidence of an avalanche of voters to the Democracy.

This will be offset by the gain of two members at large. We have an organization outside of Cook county that permeates every school district in the State, and is represented by 14,000 workers, while the Republican organization is represented by only about 2,000 workers. Hereafter many Democrats in this State have stayed away from the polls, thinking their vote would do no good if cast. This year our people are confident of victory, and a full Democratic vote can be depended on. The increased registration in Cook county would reasonably warrant the conclusion reached by the men who have expressed an opinion on the majority for the Democratic ticket in Cook county. The efficient work of the Western branch of the National Campaign Committee, under Chairman Cable, has been of inestimable advantage in this State, and the party was never before in better shape.

No Figures, but Confident Claims. The Republican State Central Committee gave out the following statement:

It is the opinion of the Republican State Committee that Illinois will give an increased Republican majority; that, however, depending on the result of Cook county. There is no question whatever that the State outside will give President Harrison a larger majority than four years ago, and Governor Fifer will be little if any behind the President. The German defection, about which so much has been said, has been grossly exaggerated, and there are large gains from conservative Democratic sources.

We expect to elect 13 Congressmen beyond a doubt outside of Cook county. Fifer in the Sixteenth and Forman in the Eighteenth, in addition. In the Second, Fourth, Fifth, Sixth, Fourth, Fifth, Sixth, and Fourth Congressional districts, which have been claimed as doubtful by the Democrats, there is no question of the election of the Republican candidates, and we firmly believe that we will elect Mr. Bassett in the Tenth, Mr. Folger in the Forty-second, and Mr. Boston in the Forty-eighth. There is little doubt that we will have control of both branches of the Legislature. All Senators elected at this election will participate in the election of a United States Senator, two years hence.

CONNECITICUT. Considerable of a Closeness in the State of Wooden Nutmegs. NEW HAVEN, CONN., Nov. 7.—The Chairman of both the Democratic and Republican State Central Committees were interviewed by the Associated Press to-night as to the outcome of the election to-morrow. Herbert E. Benton, Chairman of the Republican committee, said he expected his party would secure a safe plurality for both the electoral and State tickets. He looked for the election of a Legislature which would be Republican in both branches. Three out of four of the Republican candidates for Congress would be elected, and he should not be at all surprised if his party made a clean sweep, insuring a full Republican representation in both houses of Congress at Washington.

Chairman Clinton B. Davis, of the Democratic State Committee, said he was absolutely certain the Democratic electoral ticket in this State would have a plurality of not less than 2,000. Judge Morris, he said, would poll more votes for Governor than General Merwin, as he did two years ago, but not a sufficient number to insure an election by the people, and that the election of Governor would therefore be thrown into the Legislature. The Legislature, he said, was in doubt as to its political complexion on a joint ballot, and no one could foretell the result. The State Senate would be made up of Democratic by a good working majority. The Democrats were sure of three Congressmen out of four, viz: Sperry in the First district, Piggott in the Second and DeForest in the Fourth.

OHIO. The Democrats Concede Just Half What the Republicans Claim. COLUMBUS, O., Nov. 7.—[Special.]—The Chairman of the respective State committees have completed their work and left this evening for their home to vote and will return to-morrow afternoon. They are simply waiting for the result. Chairman Farley, of the Democratic committee, has made no estimate of the result in this State, for the reason the Democratic committee had no poll, and he had nothing tangible upon which to do so. He ventured the opinion, however, that the Republicans could be disappointed in their claims of a plurality. Mr. Farley thought the Republicans would be very lucky if they had 15,000 plurality, and he believed it would fall behind the Weaver.

Chairman Dick had no reason to change the figures which he had already given out, and he thought the Republican plurality would be from 22,000 to 25,000. He had a very good poll of the State on which to base his estimates, though there were several counties which were estimated by the county committees and the results sent in by telegraph. He claims 15 of the 21 Congressmen, and there is very little division of opinion as to these figures. The majorities in the districts are so pronounced that the Chairman on either side cannot see how the results can be otherwise. The People's party and Prohibition vote was about 43,000 in the State last year, and Mr. Dick thinks there will be considerable falling off in both this year. As they were drawn pretty equally from each party, the theory is that they will seek their old affiliations and not materially affect the general result.

NEW YORK. Chairman Carter Calls It Republican, but Harry Says He's Mistaken. NEW YORK, Nov. 7.—The expectations at Democratic headquarters were to-night announced as follows: There has been an increase of 50,000 in registration in New York, Queens, Kings and Richmond. We should get no less than 90,000 more out of them. The Republicans will not meet this with more than 60,000 of their increased registration in rural districts, and therefore we expect 30,000 plurality for Cleveland in the State of New York. Chairman Harry would give no figures on New York State. Of the general result he said: Mr. Cleveland will get at least 54 votes in the electoral college, and will be solid south of 192 New York, 26 Michigan, 15 New Jersey, 36 Connecticut, 6 Indiana, 6 Wisconsin, 6 Pennsylvania, 6 Ohio, 6 Missouri, also, of Colorado, Illinois and Iowa.

Chairman Carter said: "From the best information and belief I am satisfied that the popular verdict will re-elect President Harrison. New York State will be Republican, and I look for an increased majority over 1888. There will be no slump in the Western States."

NEW JERSEY. A Full Vote Expected and a Small Democratic Plurality. TRENTON, N. J., Nov. 7.—New Jersey will vote to-morrow for Presidential electors and for Governor, eight Congressmen, seven Senators and 50 members of the Assembly. The next Legislature will elect a successor to United States Senator Rufus S. Blodgett. The vote is to be compared with that of 1888, when the vote was as follows: Harrison, 144,342; Cleveland, 15,483; Prohibitionist, 19,044. Three years ago the Democratic candidate for Governor polled 138,245, and the Republican candidate 123,992. Registration totals are not available to-night.

"The only thing we have to fear," says Mr. Taggart, "is Republican fraud, and we have taken ample precautions to guard against these evil propensities."

INDIANA. Both Parties Still Claiming the Hoosier State by 10,000. INDIANAPOLIS, Nov. 7.—The statements of the Chairman of the several State Committees, given out this morning, when taken collectively shed little light upon to-morrow's election. Chairman Taggart, of the Democratic State Committee, claims the State by a plurality which he says will certainly not fall below 10,000, both branches of the Legislature, and 11 out of 13 members of Congress. "The only thing we have to fear," says Mr. Taggart, "is Republican fraud, and we have taken ample precautions to guard against these evil propensities."

The People's party, Chairman Taggart, has placed the People's vote at 2,369 precincts in the State, and is claiming the People's party vote has been accurately polled, and is pledged to stand by the party through all contingencies. The Populist Chairman claims 15 members of the Legislature, and that they will hold the balance of power in that body, and dictate the election of a successor to Senator Turpie.

WEST VIRGINIA. Both Sides Acknowledge the Result Hangs in the Balance. CHARLESTON, W. Va., Nov. 7.—That West Virginia is an extremely doubtful State is acknowledged by the conservative element in all parties. There are four tickets in the field, viz: Democratic, Republican, Prohibitionist and Populist. The last named party has a considerable foothold in the State, and would, within the past three or four weeks numbers have deserted their ranks and gone back to either the Democratic or Republican parties. The Prohibitionists will cast no figure of any importance in the fight to-morrow. The great battle is between the Democrats and Republicans, both of whom have made a close canvass of the voting strength in this State. So close has the canvass been made that the Republicans claim the State, from the electoral vote to the State Assembly, including everything, by from 3,000 to 4,400. The Democrats are both cautious and conservative, and the State Executive Committee, whose headquarters are in this city, is confident that the State will give its electoral vote for Cleveland, and that all State officers and the Legislature will be Democratic. The majority will probably be 1,500 to 2,000.

MICHIGAN. Republicans Claim to Have the State Solid by About 18,000. DETROIT, Nov. 7.—Both Republicans and Democrats claim this State. Daniel J. Campau, Chairman of the Democratic State Central Committee, says his party will elect its State ticket by a good majority and more than half of the Presidential electors and Congressmen. He also hopes to have a majority in the next Legislature, which will elect a United States Senator to succeed Francis R. Stockbridge, whose term will expire in January, and whose name is given, however, to substantiate these claims.

SENATOR McMillan, Chairman of the Republican State Central Committee, predicts a victory for his party in this State. He declares the State ticket will be elected by a plurality of from 14,000 to 18,000. A majority will be had in the next Legislature, thus making the United States Senatorship safe for the Democrats. Chairman McMillan says that large gains will be made in the number of Congressmen elected the last time, and eight of the Republican electors, he thinks, are safe. It is asserted by the Chairman of the Prohibition and People's committees that their respective parties will each poll about 30,000 votes.

VIRGINIA. The Democrats Believe They Will Have 15,000 Plurality. RICHMOND, Nov. 7.—The close of the political canvass in this State to-night was a quiet one. The Democrats have made an active fight throughout Virginia, while the Republicans and Third parties have had few speakers on the hustings. The Republicans have no regular candidates in the field for Congress except in the Ninth district, but it seems generally understood that the party as a whole will support the Third party candidate whose name appears on the same ticket with the Harrison electors. Leading Democrats throughout the State appear confident that Cleveland will carry Virginia by a large majority, while some place the figures as high as 20,000. Republicans will not give figures for Harrison, but affirm that the State will cast its electoral vote for him. Chairman Gordon, of the Democratic State Committee, to-night claims that Virginia will give Cleveland 15,000 plurality.

WISCONSIN. Democrats Even Claim This Old-Timer by 13,000 Plurality. MILWAUKEE, Wis., Nov. 7.—Both Chairman Wall, of the Democratic, and Chairman Thom, of the Republican State Committee, believe success is certain for their parties in this State. Mr. Wall says: I see no reason why I should change my figures made Saturday. It is my judgment that the State of Wisconsin will go Democratic to-morrow by at least 13,000; that there will be a solid Republican majority of the vote of Mr. Cleveland and Governor Peck. The Legislature will be Democratic in both branches, the Senate by a large majority. This prediction is not more guess work, but is the result of careful examination and comparison.

NEVADA. Weaver Likely to Get the Electoral Vote, but by a Small Figure. SAN FRANCISCO, Nov. 7.—An authoritative dispatch from Nevada this evening says it is impossible to venture a prediction as to plurality, but Weaver will probably carry the State. Nevada, the Third party candidate for Congress, will also probably get a majority slightly less than Weaver's. Stewart has an even chance of losing four counties in this Senatorial contest—Storey, Washoe, Ormsby and Douglas—in which case he will be beaten by the opposition hold-over Republican Senators.

ALABAMA. Democrats Expect Cleveland's Clear Majority to be 27,000. BIRMINGHAM, ALA., Nov. 7.—The Democratic headquarters have news from every county in the State. Without exception they show uniform gains over the August vote, when the Democrats had 12,000 majority.

OREGON. Harry Orders Democrats of This State to Vote for Weaver. PORTLAND, ORE., Nov. 7.—In accordance with the instructions from the Democratic National Committee the Chairman of the Democratic State Committee to-day issued the following circular: DEMOCRATS OF OREGON.—Important orders have been received from Chairman Harry. The election of Cleveland depends on Oregon going for Weaver. A Democratic vote for Harrison in this State is a vote for Harrison. If you are a Democrat and want Cleveland elected, vote for Weaver.

NORTH DAKOTA. Republicans Still Claim This New State by About 2,000. BISMARCK, N. D., Nov. 7.—After a careful canvass on the part of the Republican Committee Chairman Spalding is willing to go on record with the prediction of the election of the Republican electors by 2,000; Congressman by 1,500, and Governor and the entire State ticket by 1,000, with the possible exception of one railroad commissioner.

CALIFORNIA. The State Solidly Republican if the Populists Aren't Very Plenty. SAN FRANCISCO, Nov. 7.—The campaign in California closed with the three principal State committees claiming victory to-morrow, though Democratic claims are made with certain qualifications. Max Popper, Chairman of the Democratic Committee, says that if 20,000 votes are polled for Weaver the State will go for Cleveland, and he is inclined to believe the Populist vote will be large enough to secure Democratic victory. The Populists' committee claims Weaver will carry the State by a small plurality. Chairman Meyers, of the Republican State Committee, will not make a statement as to plurality, but says that his committee has the greatest confidence that the State will go for Harrison.

SOUTH CAROLINA. A Plurality of 50,000 Here if the Tickets Are Legal. CHARLESTON, S. C., Nov. 7.—The only element of doubt that exists in the contest is the voting of the Democratic ballots. It is said that it is only the Presidential electoral tickets that are of illegal size, the State tickets being of the regulation pattern, and this would seem to give color to rumors of bad faith on the part of the Alliance men, who control the Democratic machine. Most of the county chairmen, however, have been warned, and if they desire to do so they can be remedied, but on the other hand, most of the county chairmen are Alliance men, too, and it is doubtful if they will correct the mistake unless State Chairman Irby orders them to do so.

MARYLAND. Democrats Say It's Grover's by 10,000. Repulicans Concede It by 6,000. BALTIMORE, Md., Nov. 7.—The Chairman of the State Committee of the Democratic and Republican parties having finished their labors have gone to their respective homes to vote. The Republicans at headquarters say they expect that Cleveland's plurality in Maryland will not be more than 6,000, and probably less.

IDAHO. Another Western State That is Apparently in Doubt. BOISE CITY, Nov. 7.—The chairman of the Republican State Committee claims this State for Harrison by 1,200 to 1,500 plurality. The Populists estimate Weaver electors will have 4,000 plurality. They are being induced by the Democrats, who claim the State for Weaver by 2,500.

WASHINGTON. Republicans Confident of Coming Out All Right in the New State. TACOMA, WASH., Nov. 7.—The Republicans are confident that Washington will give Harrison 5,000 to 7,000 plurality. Both the Democrats and Republicans claim the State by a small plurality. It seems probable, however, Harrison will carry the State.

NEVADA. Complete election returns from all parts of the U. S. will be published in to-morrow's Dispatch. The estimate of the Democratic State Committee is that Cleveland will have a clear majority of 27,000 over Harrison and Weaver combined, and elect members of Congress by not less than 1,000 majority, and from that to 5,000.
