

HOW THE CITY WENT.

Returns From City and Country Districts Slow, but Republican.

TWO SENATORIAL FIGHTS.

Jerry Doherty Has a Big Majority in 15 Out of 77 Districts.

SNEE HOLDING STEELE VERY LEVEL.

Homestead Strikers Give Grover, the Winner, a Majority.

THE REPUBLICANS CARRY THE COUNTY.

At midnight 19 districts from Allegheny county had been heard from, showing a net Republican gain of 193 over the vote of 1878.

As was expected the national ticket takes precedence over the local, and the results were small-likely coming in. From the few districts returned Daisell was running ahead of the ticket.

Nothing of any account has been received from the Steele-Snee fight on the Southside.

Acheson's Election Predicted. In the Twenty-fourth Congressional district, Register Connor, who is familiar with the situation, said that Acheson would win by 900 votes.

C. L. Magee left the fire alarm office about 9 o'clock and at midnight had not returned.

Stone Wins an Easy Victory. William A. Stone, Republican, carried the Twenty-third Congressional district against Frank C. Osburn, Democrat.

Joseph Wertheimer and Charles A. Muehlthroner, Republican candidates in the First Legislative district, were both successful.

William T. Marshall and William J. McDonald are the winners in the Second district. They are Republicans.

Michael B. Lennon and Archibald Mackrell, Republicans, will represent the Third district in the next Legislature.

John Kearns, Democrat, had a walkover in the Fourth district, his only opponent being a People's party man.

A Quartette of Republican Winners. Samuel M. Lafferty, W. M. Culbertson, David E. Weaver and Emmett Cotton, Republicans, are winners in the Fifth district.

Joseph T. Richey and Samuel Wallace had no difficulty in winning on the Republican ticket in the Seventh district.

Samuel E. Stewart, Republican, from the Eighth district, is returned with a comfortable majority.

Hon. Edwin H. Stowe's re-election as Judge of Common Pleas Court No. 1 was practically unanimous.

Heber McDowell was triumphantly re-elected to his third term as Coroner of Allegheny county.

Henry Oebse was elected over John Zwick, Democrat, for Director of the Poor without trouble.

At 1 o'clock returns from 28 districts in Pittsburgh were received indicating a net gain of 102 votes.

Every one was surprised at the good showing made by Jerry Doherty.

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FITCH IS AT WORK.

Getting Evidence All Election Day as to Davenport and His Actions

AS TO ARRESTS IN GOTHAM.

He Claims He Has Testimony Enough Against the Supervisor

TO REPORT ON HIM TO CONGRESS.

He Only Regrets That He Has No Photographs of the Marshals

WHO ARRESTED WELL-KNOWN MEN

(SPECIAL TELEGRAM TO THE DISPATCH.) NEW YORK, Nov. 8.—The sub-committee of the Congress Committee appointed to investigate "Davenportism" gathered material to-day for a report on fraud and intimidation.

The committee had its sergeant at arms on guard down stairs, at the doors of the court room where the United States Commissioners were sitting.

Altogether, 214 cases were heard by the committee. The routine in every case was the same and in each case the marshal had a chance to tell his story.

"If I only had a kodak," said Mr. Fitch, "to picture some of these marshals. They are the most remarkable looking wretches I ever saw in my life."

The first arrest of the day that was brought out to the attention of the court was that of Patrick McKenna.

The young marshal in the course of a half hour's questioning admitted that he had known Mr. McKenna a number of years, and knew that he was a prominent Democrat in the district.

John Carrick, who lives at 45 Benwick street, came in in charge of Deputy Marshal John Thompson.

"I don't know," said Thompson, "A man told me to arrest him, and I did it."

Gustav Robinson, of 61 East Houston street, had been arrested by a marshal.

"Did he ask you how you intended to vote?" "Yes, sir."

"What did you do?" "I threatened to take him by the collar and throw him down the stairs."

"Did you vote?" "I did, and he was brought before Commissioner Shields and discharged."

Made to Deposit His Vote. Charley Champagne, who had been a lawyer for 19 years, was sworn.

Richard Boverly, driver, of 8 Hague street, had lived in the same election district five years, and was known to everybody in the neighborhood.

In the case of John S. Williams, the marshal, Thomas Barbour, registered the first day and had worked every day since.

Altogether, today, 125 arrests were made, of whom 150 were discharged and 50 jailed.

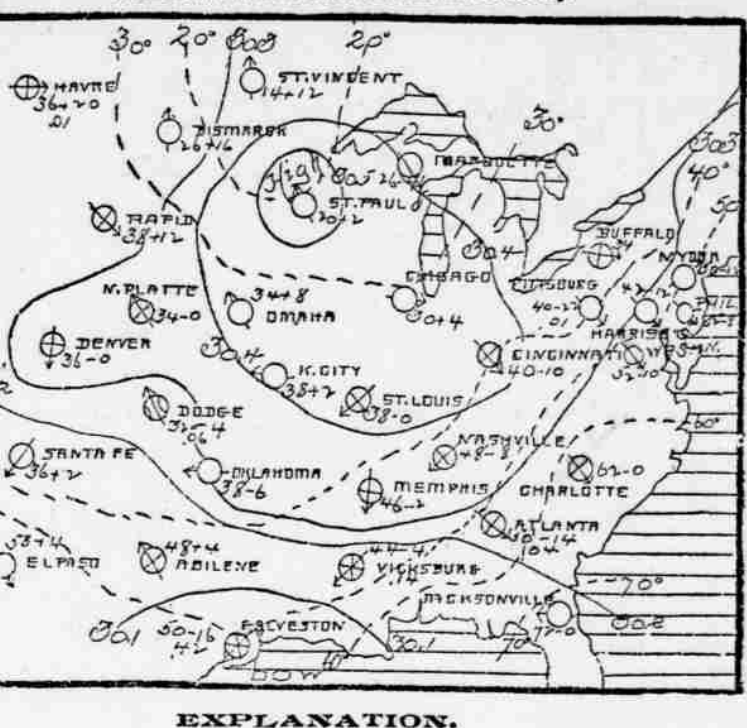
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THE DISPATCH WEATHER MAP.
