# WHEAT IS UP A LITTLE

On the Government Report, Corn and Provisions Easier and Oats Slightly Higher.

CHICAGO, Nov. IL-Wheat was on the jump to-day. The Government crop report was the cause, and the price was litted 13cc, closing within Sec of the top. The figures on orn muddled the pit, and that cereal left off with a loss of 1/2c. Oats are unchanged and provisions a shade easier. A good deal of alarm among shorts was

manifest at the opening in wheat. There was a general rush to cover, and the market for a time was quite excited. Cables were weak and lower, but this had little or no influence here. After the noon hour the market had another spurt, but the realizing sales sent it back somewhat. It is somesales sent it hock somewhat. It is some-thing unasual for the Government to make a report on the wheat crop in November, and operators did not look for any report. Last month's percentages indicated a crop of 519 000,000 bushels, based on the percentages of acreage published in June and, the aver-age yield per acre published in October con-firmed the estimated acreage and the indi-cated yield as then published. But the report yesterday, as given out by the Government Department, says that the yield will not ex-ceed 500,000,000 bushels, and it was this which created the strength and advance in the market. It was a decided surprise. Corn was active and unsettled. Opening trades were 140% cabove the flual figures of yesterday, the Government report placing the yield per acre at 22.4 bushels, heing construed by some as "builish." The report reduced previous estimates about 35,000,000 bushels. The near futures were relatively easier than May, which tended to depress that nuture.

easier than May, which tended to depress that future. Oats averaged slightly higher. The provision market was not very active. The principal feature of the trading in the pit was the selling of January and buying of May lard by Wright at 5c difference in price. Prices were at their best for the day soon after the opening.
