PEPPER'S COMPREHENSIVE QUESTIONS

No. All workmen who have given the matter any study know that law and order are to be preserved. They dislike Pinkertons because they are men recklessly gathered from all sorts of places and of no respectable standing.

The Object of Labor Organizations. Q. Are there not a few restless men in all large manufacturing who cause trouble? A. Sometimes there are such men, but the labor organizations have a tendency to keep just such men in order, to restrain their radicalism.

Mr. Weithe then described the origin and growth, the objects and attainments of the Amalgamated Association, which he said had always thrown its influence against strikes, the first long important strike in its history being that at Homestead.

When Mr. Weithe had accepted his \$2 witness fee, somewhat larger pay for an hour's talk than the average mechanic makes in the same time with muscle and brain, his place was taken by William T. Robertson, who had come in with the big chestnut of the Amalgamated stout, brassy head, whose head hardly came up to Mr. Weithe's chest.

Examined by Senator Gallinger. Q. Are the Carnegie's rehiring their old men without reference to any list? A. I would not like to swear that there is a blacklist in the Carnegie office, but I am sure that there is. They are discriminating against former employees who had influence among their fellows.

Q. Do the native or foreign workmen cause the most trouble? A. Well, I am not prepared to say. The foreign and native element are in the same boat, in the Amalgamated. It isn't the common laborer who makes trouble over. You won't find English-speaking men among the common laborers nowadays to any extent.

Q. Have you any remedy for troubles between employers and employees? A. Yes, I believe in arbitration—compulsory arbitration, binding employer and employee alike. They must both be compelled to abide by the arbitrator's decision.

Q. Did they not turn the Sheriff's deputies out of Homestead? A. You must remember there were 80 or 85 regulars, and there were others who spoke English, but none of whom properly understood what the deputies were there for, and I believe they did escort them out of town.

Q. How do you suggest the board of arbitration should be constituted? A. I think it should be appointed by the National Government, and have the prerogative to enforce its decisions upon all parties; upon great manufacturing concerns by taking away their charters, and upon the smaller, by preferential arbitration boards appointed by the National Government to one appointed by the State.

Q. Do you believe the party in power or Congress would have the support of working men if they restricted immigration? A. Yes.

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I remember one case where an action was granted to restrain employees from boycotting a firm. This was the case of Broce Bros. Q. Was the injunction granted? A. Eventually, yes.

Q. Then the course pursued by Broce Bros. could have been followed by the Carnegie Company instead of resorting to Pinkertons? A. I think it would have applied. It is hard to prove and hard to get an injunction. It is much easier to obtain than if the way was more practical. There is generally a great delay.

Q. Do you ever have any labor troubles in connection with your mining interests? A. Yes, we had at one time. The trouble generally originates between organized and non-union labor. The union labor is always aggressive and tries to force the non-union to join.

Q. Can you explain why in this enlightened State of Pennsylvania and in this the close of the nineteenth century such careless laws as these exist? A. In my opinion there is too much party politics for the good of the people. Preference for office depends on service to the party instead of fitness for the position.

Q. What is the best way of settling disputes between employers and employees? A. By both parties getting together and talking the matter over. The conference committee is the best peace engine I know.

Q. What do you mean by that the Sheriff's deputies were out of Homestead through fear of political consequences? A. I do. Q. Would the same suggestion apply to the Governor? For instance, we seldom hear a Sheriff who can and will do his duty. There is also too much delay in ordering out the military, the Governor leaning to the right.

Q. Do you think the Sheriff and Carnegie Company exhausted all their powers before securing an injunction? A. Yes, I think he did as he regarded his powers, but it was only in a perfunctory way.
